
ProView eBooks

to the **Thomson Reuters (West) ProView <u>eBooks</u>** platform. The resource can be accessed via IP authentication, from oncampus or off-campus using your Fordham login. ProView offers nearly 200 Thomson Reuters titles on topics ranging from


Intellectual Property Law to Administrative Law, organized for simple browsing and searching, as well as reading on a desktop or mobile device. These titles can be annotated and highlighted as you read within the platform, and exported as an annotated PDF file.
