A Yes.

COMMISSIONER GRANT: Commissioner Loomis?

COMMISSIONER LOOMIS: No questions.

COMMISSIONER ELOVICH: Nothing.

Q Anything else we should talk about that we haven't discussed or anything else you would like to say on your own behalf?

A The only thing I want to say is during the course of this time I tried to, you know, truly change my ways. You know, as far as reacting to things violently or physically, aggressively, I think I got all of that out of my character. I don't deal with, I don't deal with situations like that anymore. And, you know, I just want a chance to try to go out there and get ahold of my life.

Q You've had a very good disciplinary record since

June of 1990. That was your last Tier 3. You've had no

problems. I see '95 you had an altered item. No major

disciplinary problems in over 13 plus years. So you haven't

had any problems as far as that goes disciplinary wise.

You've had a difficult time with your mother. You were

living a complicated life at that point. She wasn't helpful

to you and we understand that and you had a long term

relationship with her that wasn't really productive.

Obviously the major concern for us is the excessive violence

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that you demonstrated, but we do see inside that you haven't, you haven't resorted to any of that behavior inside and that's to your credit. You have programmed effectively inside. Another bit of concern is we have to firm up your residence and we would have to work closely with you on the outside. An important part of your re-entry is having a good residence plan. Do you think you'd benefit from counseling on the outside as well? That's again if we released you. I think we would put a condition in just to have a mental health evaluation, you know. They have had an evaluation here and they say you are doing well, but you would have the same stressors out there. And would you be agreeable to that?

A Yes.

Q It's going to be a tough decision, but we'll take everything into consideration and give you a decision in writing in a few days. Good luck to you.

(Inmate excused.)

(After due deliberation by the Parole Board Panel, the following decision was rendered:)

DECISION

COMMISSIONER GRANT: Denied 24 months.

After a review of the record and interview, the panel has determined that if released at this time, your release would be incompatible with the welfare of society. This decision is based on the following factors:

Your instant offense, murder in the second degree, Al, represents a continuation of a criminal history that includes prior convictions for attempted robbery in the second degree and burglary in the third degree. You have maintained a clean disciplinary record since December of 2005. This panel notes your positive programmatic participation including completion of ASAT, ART and Phase 3.

(The above decision was reached after due deliberations and Commissioners concur.)
