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- 1 COMM. THOMPSON: Good evening.
- THE INMATE: Good evening. Yes.
- 3 COMM. THOMPSON: I am Commissioner Thompson.
- 4 Also, on the panel with me today are Commissioners
- 5 Ferguson and Stanford.
- 6 COMM. STANFORD: Good evening.
- 7 COMM. FERGUSON: Hello, sir.
- 8 THE INMATE: Good evening.
- 9 BY COMMISSIONER THOMPSON:
- 10 Q. Sir, you are here today for a reappearance.
- 11 Crime of conviction, Murder, Second, serving
- 12 twenty-five to life-year sentence; Manslaughter, First,
- 13 twelve and-a-half to twenty-five; Criminal Possession of
- 14 a Weapon, Second, seven and-a-half to fifteen; and
- 15 Attempted Robbery, First, seven and-a-half to fifteen,
- 16 all by verdict; is that correct?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 Q. The instant offense involved you, during the
- 19 course of a robbery, shooting the victim, causing his
- 20 death. Why did you involve yourself with this crime,
- 21 sir?
- 22 A. The night before, I came home from work, and I
- 23 had went gambling, and I had lost my money. I met these
- 24 dudes at the gambling spot, and they asked me, did I
- 25 want to commit a robbery, and I agreed. We went to the

- 1 cab stand, and that's where the Attempted Robbery took
- 2 place.
- I did it out of greed, because I lost all my
- 4 money. I did it out of ignorance. Nobody else got
- 5 arrested. I got arrested the next day. They asked me
- 6 about the guys. I didn't know the guys. I had just met
- 7 them. I went to trial, and I lost.
- 8 Q. Did you have the gun and did you shoot the
- 9 victim?
- 10 A. Yes, I did.
- 11 Q. Prior to the instant offense, you did have a
- 12 Criminal Possession of a Weapon, Third. Was that also a
- 13 gun?
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 O. And why were you carrying a gun in the community?
- 16 I also see a YO Robbery, Third, at one point.
- 17 Why so much crime?
- 18 A. I had a gambling fetish. When I would lose my
- 19 money, I would commit robberies, like an idiot.
- 20 O. So there were other robberies that you did not
- 21 get caught for; is that what you're saying?
- 22 A. Unfortunately, I got caught for every robbery I
- 23 committed. The only crimes I didn't get caught for was
- 24 the illegal gambling I did.
- Q. Where did you get the gun from, one of your

- 1 co-defendants that you didn't know?
- 2 A. Yes.
- 3 Q. You didn't know this victim, at all?
- 4 A. No, I didn't know.
- 5 Q. How old was the victim, do you know?
- 6 A. He was maybe in his late fifties.
- 7 Q. Did you know that you had killed him?
- 8 A. No. No. I shot him in the stomach, so I didn't
- 9 think I had killed him.
- 10 Q. Why did you feel that you had to shoot him?
- 11 A. Because, actually, when I pulled out the gun, he
- 12 must have thought the gun was a fake gun, being that it
- 13 was so small. It was a .22. He swung at me, so I shot
- 14 him in the stomach.
- 15 Q. And did you also rob him? Did you take anything?
- 16 A. No.
- 17 O. Did your co-defendants?
- 18 A. No.
- 19 O. So he was shot, and then you ran away?
- 20 A. Yes.
- 21 Q. We do not have your Sentencing Minutes, but they
- 22 were requested on two separate occasions. We did try to
- 23 obtain them. We did give the court more than ample time
- 24 to respond, and they have not.
- 25 You were there at sentencing. Was there anything

- 1 said, that you would like to bring to our attention?
- 2 A. No.
- 3 Q. Upon release, sir, you plan to reside with a
- 4 cousin; is that still the case?
- 5 A. Yes.
- 6 Q. What programs are you in now?
- 7 A. I'm a porter in 107, as of now. I was just the
- 8 several months ago.
- 9 Q. And what do you do there as
- 10 A. With the superintendent, we try to bridge the gap
- 11 between offenders and administration. We also provide
- 12 roses for the mothers, on Mother's Day, and toys for
- 13 little kids on Christmas, and things of that nature.
- 14 Q. Are you still involved with that?
- 15 A. Yes, I am.
- 16 Q. But you are not the
- 17 A. No, I'm not the no more.
- 18 Q. How far have you gone with your education?
- 19 A. I have a Master's degree.
- 20 Q. In what?
- 21 A. Religion.
- 22 Q. And you did complete ART.
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. You did your vocational. I do see your parole
- 25 packet that you put together. Did you do that yourself?

- 1 A. Yes.
- Q. I passed it on to my fellow Commissioners.
- I see that your brother has his own company, and
- 4 he is willing to employ you there?
- 5 A. Yes.
- 6 Q. That's a
- 7 company?
- 8 A. Yes.
- 9 Q. Who else do you have out there?
- 10 A. I have my other brothers, I have my sister, I
- 11 have my cousins, I have my aunt.
- 12 Q. And I do see you have letters of support in that
- 13 respect, as well.
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 Q. We do have your COMPAS Risk Assessment. You
- 16 scored low for risk of felony violence. History of
- 17 violence is medium. Re-entry to substance abuse is
- 18 unlikely.
- 19 So you were out there committing these crimes,
- 20 because of your gambling?
- 21 A. A gambling fetish, yes.
- Q. No drugs or alcohol issues, at all, in the
- 23 community?
- 24 A. No, none.
- Q. Why not get a second job?

- 1 A. Yeah, I should have. If I'd knew better, I'd do
- 2 better. That's why I tried to educate myself while I
- 3 was in prison. The more you know, the more you grow. I
- 4 was twenty-five-years old, but I was thinking like a
- 5 seventeen-year old.
- 6 Q. Were you working at the time?
- 7 A. Yes, I was working at that time.
- 8 Q. I see your disciplinary has improved over the
- 9 years. Your last disciplinary looks like it was in '05;
- 10 is that correct?
- 11 A. Yes.
- 12 COMM. THOMPSON: Commissioners, any other
- 13 questions?
- 14 COMM. FERGUSON: Nothing additional. Thank
- 15 you.
- 16 COMM. STANFORD: No questions. Thank you.
- 17 COMM. THOMPSON: You have the last word,
- 18 Is there anything else?
- 19 THE INMATE: Yes, I do have one thing I have
- 20 to say.
- 21 I have a deep-seeded remorse for
- because he didn't have to die like that. I
- 23 wish I could right that terrible wrong. If I had it my
- 24 way, you know, I would like to have God prepare me, as
- 25 far as when I go or perish, that I could meet up with

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him, and I could explain the things to him about how I'm
 1
     feeling in terms of my remorse, my regret, and my
 2

    sorrow.

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1	. <u>DECISION</u>
2	COMM. THOMPSON: Hold
3	twenty-four months. Next appearance, 7/16.
4	After a careful review of the record and interview,
5	the panel has determined, that if released at this time,
6	your release would not be compatible with the welfare of
7	society.
8	The heinous nature of the instant offense of
9	Murder, Second; Manslaughter, First; Criminal Possession
10	of a Weapon, Second; and Attempted Robbery, First;
11	involved you, while acting in concert, in an Attempted
12	Robbery, shooting the victim, causing his demise.
13	Your actions clearly displayed a propensity for
14	violence and a callous disregard for the sanctity of
15	human life.
16	The panel has considered all required statutory
17	factors, as well as your risk to the community,
18	rehabilitative efforts, needs for a successful
19	reintegration, release plan, institutional adjustment,
20	community support, community opposition, and parole
21	packet; however, despite your positive efforts while
22	incarcerated, your release would greatly undermine
23	respect for the law and trivialize the tragic loss of
24	life that you caused.
