After settling in San Pietro he became secretary to the Baron Collice who owned the only mill in the town.

A short time later he fell in love with a beautiful lady named [REDACTED] daughter of a well known and respected family and were married. In a little over 3 years they were blessed with the birth of 2 lovely daughters, [REDACTED] (my mother) and [REDACTED]. Then misfortune struck as it sometimes does in some households, [REDACTED] my grandfather, was again recalled for an extra 6 months of compulsory duty and while on maneuvers contracted pneumonia and died. He was only 28 years of age.

This left my grandmother almost devastated, but being from a very religious family she entered the girls in the convent of San Pietro where they grew into womanhood.

[REDACTED] who at that time was a contractor and builder, fell in love with my mother who was now 18 and very beautiful. They were married in the church that the "Sicula" generations built and finished. While in Italy they had four children, 3

boys and 1 girl. I, being the second child.
We emigrated to the United States in 1911
and lived in 4 different states before settling
in Conn. A state which we love!

We have always been proud of the [redacted]
name here and in San Pietro where it is
highly respected, but now that the name
[redacted] has achieved world wide prom-
inence has made us doubly proud.

If you can find the time in your
busy schedule to visit your beautiful mother
and talk over ancestry with her perhaps we
would find some clue to our relationship.

May God always keep you well
especially during the coming trying weeks.
Our prayers are with you and your family,
especially your mother.
