  - A. Yes.
  - Q. According to the record, your instant offense involved you stabbing a female victim who was a neighbor over 40 times resulting in her death, and then while you were incarcerated at Sing Sing you possessed a toothbrush with a sharpened screw melted into the handle and that's how you got your prison contraband conviction.
  - A. Yes.

Q. Okay. Is there anything you would like to say regarding the instant offense before we move onto your efforts toward rehabilitation?

- A. Yes. It happened when I was young and I want to say I'm sorry to the family of the victim and her mother, and sorry to friends and my family and everybody that I hurt by this experience.
- Q. Okay. Thank you for the expression of remorse. What do you think caused that type of severe rage where you would stab someone over 40 times?
- A. I mean, like when I was living in was week, and it just seemed like it was hopeless and it just kept building up, building up from the abuse and stuff like that, and there was nobody to really turn to.

  Q. So, why did you take that out on this particular
- A. It wasn't intentionally, like something that I planned. I never planned it. It's just something that built up, built up in me and I just bursted out at that time.

- Q. Snapped?
- A. Yes.

- Q. Now, how is your mental health, sir, I see you have had some mental health issues, you have been involved in ICP here and they have designated you as a 1-S, which means that is pretty much the most serious type of mental health issues. You have been diagnosed with a delusional disorder, do you have that under control, are you on medication?
- A. Basically, yes, it's under control. I also got diabetes and I didn't know I had diabetes and I have like a brain defect, a brain injury, and when my sugar is out of control, like when my sugar gets real real high, it causes my brain injury to hurt and stuff like that, and I thought somebody was playing with my head. I didn't know I had an injury on the right side of my head, and I thought somebody was putting microchips in my head and I didn't know what was going on with me, but it was really my high sugar.
- Q. So, you know what's going on with yourself now?
- A. Yes.
  - Q. Okay. Good. Tell us about your plans for release, where would you live and are you able to work or would you be collecting disability because of your mental health status?

- A. Well, my plan is to work and if I could be granted disability, I would accept it.
  - Q. I do see you have a job offer in here.

- Q. From wrote you a letter saying that he would hire you as a junior apprentice?
  - A. Yes.
    - Q. Okay. I also see you have some letters of support from people, family and friends that care about you and want to see you come home.
- 12 A. Yes.
  - Q. Okay. We will take that into consideration. Now, since your last board appearance, you have one Tier III ticket from Elmira ICP involving harassment, you got 90 days S.H.U. for that, that was an incident that occurred on July 26th of 2014. Anything you want to say regarding that ticket?
  - A. Yes. I think that was like -- I think that ticket occurred because of my own stupidity, that I wasn't really doing what I was supposed to be doing at that time. I was doing good, but there were other things that I should have been doing that I wasn't at that time, and I got punished 90 days for it basically.

4	A. Thank you.			
5	Q. We have your COMPAS re-entry risk assessment form in			
6	the file, it outlines you as a low overall risk. In			
7	terms of your needs in the community, it has re-entry			
8	substance abuse, it has prison misconduct as high, so			
9	A.R.T. would probably be and other conditions along the			
10	misconduct line would be your conditions out in the			
11	community. In terms of family support, I saw a letter			
12	from your cousin in there. Do you have family that keeps			
13	in touch with you?			
14	A. Yes, they don't keep in touch as much as they used			
15	to, but every now and then they write me a letter, they			
16	let my mother know to write me, and my mom, she writes			
17	me. She's up there in age now, so she can't really do

inside the apartment, but I had just came home from work that night and she had called my mother, she was looking for me, but, you know, I take full responsibility for what I have done because I know it was something terrible and I tried to, you know, over the years, address the situation, asking myself why did this happen to me and why did I let this happen to me, and, you know, I have better insight now.

A. I know how to seek help, things that I now know that I didn't know then. Even if it's food pantry, shelter, you know, things that can help me to get ahead and take care of myself.

#### DECISION

Denied 24 months. Next appearance 7/2017. After a review of the record and interview, the panel has determined that if released at this time your release would be incompatible with the welfare of society and would so deprecate the serious nature of the crime as to undermine respect for the law. The Board has considered your institutional adjustment including discipline and program participation. Required statutory factors have been considered, including your risk to society, rehabilitation efforts, and your needs for successful re-entry into the community. Your release plans have also been considered. More compelling, however, is the extreme violence you exhibited in the instant offense and your poor institutional behavior since your last Board appearance. Your instant offense involved you stabbing a female victim numerous times causing her death. While incarcerated, you possessed a weapon. Since your last Board appearance you incurred a Tier III infraction for harassment. The Board has also considered community opposition to your release. The Board notes your participation in ICP, completion of ASAT, work in food service, letters of support, and employment letter.
