And present 4 0 Mr. also with us today are Commissioners Smith and Johnson. 5 6 COMMISSIONER JOHNSON · Hello 7 COMMISSIONER SMITH Hello 8 A Hello You are before us today as an initial applicant 9 0 10 for parole release You are presently serving terms of 25 to life, two counts of murder in the second degree. Six to 11 12 years for five counts of robbery in the first degree 12 Four and a half to nine years for burglary in the second 13 degree. And two to four years for two counts of grand 14 larceny third, degree They all appear to be running 15 concurrent with each other, is that correct? 16 17 A Yes, sır. 18 It looks like you went to trial Do you have any 0 appeals pending? 19 20 No,, I don't. Α. 21 I do want to make sure you understand that Q 22 anything, everything we do say is taken down by the 23 stenographer and if you were to say anything against your 24 interest, it possibly could be used against you if there was 25 any type of post-conviction proceeding of any nature,

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1	whether it be a direct appeal or a writ in federal or state
2	court or anything else
3	On the other hand we would like to hear your
4	your side of anything and would welcome your discussion of
5	the facts of the case But nothing negative would be taken
6	by your decision not to discuss it for the reason I've
7	given
8	Our understanding about the factors behind
9	these convictions is that on of 1977 or
10	thereabouts you and two other individuals, Mr.
11	and Mr. came upon a residence
12	in County, I believe it's the Town of
13	
14	It looks like you were the look out, but you
15	were still involved in going in there The other two
16	gentlemen went in the house with the intent of committing a
17	burglary
18	While in the house, there were several
19	children, according to what we have here. You sort of kept
20	the kids together and the other two men went in to the two
21	mothers
22	They raped them, shot them in the head and
23	then the three of you somehow ended up in Massachusetts.
24	You were found in possession of some property that belonged
25	to a neighbor of one of those people That's where another

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4 - NYSID # burglary had occurred 1 You went to trial and you were convicted of 2 the charges as I stated That is what your convictions are 3 based upon, is that correct? 4 Yes, sir Α. 5 Did you want at that discuss the facts of the Q. 6 7 case? 8 Α. Yes, I do We would like to hear your side of this. 9 Q. Okay I went to trial because I didn't want to plead 10 A guilty to everything that they had charged me with I 11 wanted to plead impartial Partially I was guilty of some 12 of the crimes but the immediate crimes and the rapes I had 13 no knowledge of, and I wasn't and I refused at that time or 14 any time to copout to something that I had no knowledge of 15 or I had no participant of 16 Through the time when whatever was taking 17 place in the house before I had entered it, I had no 18 But at the time when I did go into the house, 19 knowledge of I saw children at the front door 20 By me seeing the children at the front door, 21 it wasn't that I was instructed to be a look out, I took it 22 upon myself when I saw the children to gather the children 23 into my custody being that I understood that these other 24 two, well the people I was with was in the house with their 25

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5 - NYSID # women, but I didn't know what they was doing with the women. 1 Because from my understanding that they was 2 upstairs, I never went upstairs So by me having the 3 children right there, by the children being at the door, I 4 saw that they was crying, so I sat them all down, we all sat 5 down and I started talking to them So during the time when 6 I was talking to them --7 Did you make any attempt to call the police? Q. 8 9 Α. No, I did not You must have heard the gunshots? Q. 10 Later, I did, yes. 11 A. And what did you do then? 12 0 I held the kids, I started shaking, you know, by 13 A me hearing gunshots I started shaking and the kids started 14 crying, and I was trying to figure out what had happened and 15 then --16 At that point did you know the women were dead? 17 Q No, I did not A 18 I mean had you called the police and an ambulance 19 0. came I don't know medically, okay, what the story was, but 20 it's not impossible that they might have been saved But 21 even if it wasn't possible, you didn't know the situation, 22 some effort on your part at least at that point if you 23 thought about it, might have saved them. You ran away 24 though with the other guys, right? 25

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6 - NYSID # Yes, I did A 1 I mean you assisted them in getting away even 2 0 after the fact of knowing what they did? 3 I was in a state of shock. A 4 let me ask you this question Well, Mr. 5 0 Why would you have, even have gone there with these guys? 6 To commit a burglary 7 Α. 0 Okay And why? 8 From my understanding there was, we was A 9 supposedly going in for property 10 But regardless of whether it's cash or property, 11 Q. why would you involve yourself in any burglary, any crime, 12 what was the reason for that? 13 I don't know. 14 A Well, there had to be a reason People don't do 15 0 things for no reason You did it to get the monetary value, 16 was it not? 17 18 A Yes. Why would you need money so desperately that you 19 Q would do such a thing? 20 Well, at the time I wasn't working and I was 21 A seeking unemployment During the time when I was seeking 22 unemployment, I was picked up off the street by Mr Profit 23 and his friend And he said that he, that he was, they was 24 going to do some sort of job or something And by the time 25

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that I realized what was happening, I found out that they was doing burglaries

Q Well you do have a history of illegal conduct, right?

A Yes, I do.

Q. Going back as a juvenile, all the way back to 1967. You had a record in **Sector** I would say what we would call petit larceny And then they call it breaking and entering I'm not sure what level, whether it's a misdemeanor or felony It doesn't make much difference. The point is you were involved in larcenist activities, including home entries prior to this. And this continued I see an assault and battery in `74, is that right?

A. That's correct

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Q What happened there?

A Me and my mother's children, yes, my son's mother's children had, we was going through some problems. We had a falling out Me and my son's mother were having difficulties in the household, so by the time that she understood what she was doing and what I was doing, she had called the police on me As far as me making verbal threats or I was supposedly had assaulted her It wasn't that I assaulted her, I just, she was tired of me, I was tired of

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8 - NYSID # her, but I didn't want to leave her because of the children. 1 And she fabricate, she called the police on me and fabricate 2 a story saying that I hit her 3 Well, you did plead guilty to something, didn't 4 0. you? 5 It's not -- no, I didn't plead guilty, they gave Α. 6 They came up me, they asked me did I do it? I said, no 7 with some sort of stipulation of probation and child 8 9 support. It did say pled guilty as charged to assault and 0 10 battery and trespassing. Now this was in July of `75. In 11 February of `74 you pled guilty to something called a 12 violation of illicit or illegitimate child act I don't 13 know what that is Six years probation and 16 dollars per 14 15 week child support? 16 A Yes. And it looks like the probation is really a 17 0. mechanism to collect the money? 18 Yes. I think that's what it was. 19 A Is that basically a paternity proceeding? 20 0 Yes 21 Α. Something like that? 22 0. Yes 23 Α. I'm not saying that you are the worst criminal in 24 0 the world here. I'm just saying there was a pattern of you 25

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9 - NYSID # having problems and it was constant, so it was not outside 1 of your experience to be involved in crime So when this 2 gentleman came by and offered you an opportunity to be 3 involved in a crime, it was not something new to you, not 4 something unnatural, is that correct? 5 A Correct 6 Now you never had been involved certainly in 7 0 something of the level of what developed? 8 A. Never 9 Once you get involved in something, it could 10 0. develop into something like this. Didn't you know that they 11 had weapons? 12 No. Α 13 I saw that statement where you said that that's 14 0 15 sort of hard to be, you know --EXAMINATION BY COMMISSIONER SMITH: 16 How did the children know they had the weapons 0. 17 18 now? I gather when they saw them enter the building, 19 A enter the home or from when they came downstairs. 20 And you didn't see them? Q. 21 I didn't know they had guns on them when they 22 Α. went into the house I saw the guns as they came out. 23 You've been involved in a good number of programs 24 0 over the time that you've been incarcerated Numerous 25

And was there anything further like college? 0 4 for a year and a I went to 5 Α. Yes half and before that I went to ln 6 7 and ----Now you completed A R T , is that right? 0. 8 Yes, I have. 9 Α Any other anti-violence programs? 10 Q AVP. I did four work shops of AVP. A 11 Now I see where corrections recommended that you 0 12 should take A.S.A.T. and the sex offender program and they 13 state that you have refused that, is that correct? 14 I have refused one of them 15 Α. Well, have you taken either of them? 16 Q. No, I haven't. 17 Α. Which one did you refuse? 18 Q I think that was the K S A.T program. 19 A Okay. Well K S A T This says A.S.A T 20 0 Regardless, why did you refuse it? 21 Because I felt that I didn't need that A 22 Would that have hurt you? 23 Q It wouldn't have hurt me, no 24 Α. No I would think that a person who was convicted of 0 25

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11 - NYSID # the crimes that you were convicted of would do everything 1 2 they can to present the best package whenever they see the 3 Parole Board. Not for our sake but for your own sake And we can never understand why inmates refuse programs It can 4 never hurt them to take a program where is it might be some 5 6 benefit It just shows resistance to supervision of some 7 kind. If your parole officer says, I think 8 you ought to take X program, then you refuse it, now most of 9 10 the time they are not going to drag you down to the program 11 because that doesn't help, you are not going to get anything 12 out of a program you are forced to be in, but it shows that 13 you are not willing to work with them 14 I'm not saying this is dispositive of your 15 case, but something like that doesn't look the best? 16 Α. Correct Now I can understand if you said you refused the 17 Q. sex offender program because people think there's some sort 18 There, but once again, given what happened in 19 of stigma. this crime, it certainly wouldn't hurt 20 21 May I say something? A 22 Q. Yes 23 I've been down a long time And I understand the Α. 24 charges and I've had a lot of people to give me information 25 on these two programs, you know, as far as old timers, new

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people, young people, it didn't matter.

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And the information that I've gathered from these programs as far as the percentage of the guys that came and explain those programs to me, myself I feel that I'm a great deal stronger than the people that have taken those program because the large amount of percentage that have taken them, they mostly come back for the same charges that the A S A T. is illustrating them to them to help them change their life pattern around

And since my incarceration I've dealt with my situation of being locked up on my own, learning through other peoples' mistakes, by me being sitting this large amount of time

And for my capabilities through this time factor, I've bettered myself I teach them better issues about what their participating in then they are absorbing from the programs And I have these guys come back and tell me, and they would, you know, tell me you teach me better things pertaining to what they supposedly be giving me in K S.A.T. or A.S.A.T. than what I'm receiving and the lifestyle they're living inside these programs

Q. You may be right, Mr and you may be doing a better job then the people employed by the corrections department I know you are not suggesting that you are better than anyone else?

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Q However, we have to go by the fact that the people employed to make these decisions, which are the corrections counselors and the corrections staff, say you should take certain programs And then we go by the fact of whether or not you take them or not And if you are assisting in other areas, and I acknowledge that you've been a program and in different things, maybe you can incorporate it better in the way you do it and maybe you can benefit other people. Even if it's not directly yourself

Now there's many reasons why counselors want people to take programs You don't have to be a drug addict or an alcoholic to benefit from A S A T I think it was A.S.A.T as opposed to K.S A T But regardless of the reason, I'm just bringing it up in a general discussion that you have refused or failed to take the programs that have been recommended.

On the other hand, you have taken other ones and you've done very well. There's also numerous vocational programs that you have been in, auto mechanics. Is there other ones that you want to point out to us?

A No I've been working on auto mechanic for a long period of time, even when I was in the outside world I went to school for it and I went to different other training schoolings for it I've been dealing with, I've

1	been working on cars ever since the `60's that I can
2	remember.
3	Q. Okay If we grant release, you want to live with
4	your sister in
5	A. Yes, sır.
6	Q. You said you had a child, but I'll have to
7	believe at this time
8	A. I have two
9	Q at this time they are grown?
10	A. Yes, they they are.
11	Q. Do you have a job to go to?
12	A. I don't know right offhand because I haven't
13	contacted my sister yet I had to wait to come here first
14	to find out what's up
15	Q You do have the skills that you talked to us
16	about?
17	A Yes, I do.
18	Q And I imagine you shouldn't have any trouble
19	getting a job as an auto mechanic?
20	A I worked dealerships before getting involved with
21	this situation here.
22	Q All right. We have copies of different
23	correspondence with programs out in the community They are
24	basically but I know if you went to
25	there's programs I'm sure there also How's

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your physical health, any problems?

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Q. All right We have a current mental health evaluation that's required by law because of your crime of conviction There do not appear to be any mental health issues Do you feel there are any?

A No

Q Is there anything else you would like to discuss with us?

A. Yes. As far as what happened, I kick myself in the butt every day for being involved with the people that I was with and being at the wrong place at the wrong time I spent 25 years of my life that I'll never be able to get back. My kids are grown I missed them growing up. I understand the victims' family, I understand that they're hurting is maybe more so than I am

And at one time I had communication with and we, he gave me his phone number, we was corresponding for a period of time when I was in Sing Sing. And, you know, if I did a hundred years or whatever I did within the penitentiary, I could never mend for what happened to those women and for my being present, for what I saw, or what I participated in during that crime.

You know I feel bad about the whole situation and I fought nobody but myself, you know, and no

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1	matter what, whatever I do or whatever I could possibly do,
2	I can never bring those women back, you know.
3	This is something I have to live with for
4	for the rest of my life and it's eating me up.
5	COMMISSIONER GRABER Commissioners, any
6	questions?
7	COMMISSIONER SMITH No questions
8	COMMISSIONER JOHNSON No further questions
9	Q. Mr we are going to discuss your case
10	amongst ourselves and then you'll get a written decision in
11	a couple of days, okay?

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DECISION

All right, parole denied, hold 24 months, that will be 1/04. Parole is denied You are presently serving terms for two counts of murder second degree, five counts robbery first degree, two counts grand larceny third degree, and one count burglary second degree

They relate to you acting in concert to illegally entering a dwelling in County in 1977, shooting two women numerous times, causing their death and stealing their property.

Your two crime partners also raped the women Their children were on the premises during the crime. Your statements during the interview and to our staff seriously minimize your role and responsibilities in this crime thereby exhibiting limited insight into your criminality or actual remorse for your victims

We also note a serious prior record as a juvenile and young person consisting mainly of larcenist acts and significantly escalated with this crime

We note also several positive institutional factors However you have refused a sex offender program and A.S.A.T
