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1	BY	COMMISSIONER	CRANGLE:

- 2 Q Hello, sir. Can you state your name for the record?
- 3 A Good morning.
- 4 Q Can you state your name for the record?
- 5 A My name is my number is
- 6 Q I am Commissioner Crangle; along with me is Commissioner
- William Smith and Commissioner Julie Smith.
- 8 COMM W. SMITH: Hello.
- 9 COMM J. SMITH: Good morning.
- 10 THE INMATE: Good morning.
- 11 Q Sir, this is a reappearance for you today.
- 12 Looks like you are in state prison for murder second,
- 13 two counts; robbery first degree, four counts; burglary in
- 14 the second degree and grand larceny auto in the third
- 15 degree; is that correct?
- 16 A Yes.
- 17 Q How old are you now, sir?
- 18 A I am sixty-two years old.
- 19 Q You took everything to trial and were found guilty by
- 20 verdict.
- I know you have been through this before, in terms of
- 22 the parole interview; I want to remind you that everything
- in this discussion is being recorded; there is a
- 24 stenographer on this side of the camera and a record is
- 25 being made and it could be used in any future proceedings,

- l okay?
- 2 A Yes.
- 3 Q Sir, do you admit guilt in these crimes or do you maintain
- 4 your innocence?
- 5 A I maintain innocence to some of the crimes but I admit to
- 6 the crimes that I did take part in.
- 7 Q The record states that back in of 1977, you and your
- 8 codefendants went into a residence to burglarize it and the
- 9 residents were home?
- 10 A Yes.
- 11 Q And I note that there were children in the home and shots
- were fired. Now, you were not the shooter though, right?
- 13 A Exactly, I wasn't.
- 14 Q You were there to steal property and leave; is that your
- 15 end?
- 16 A Yes, sir.
- 17 Q But your codefendants went above and beyond what was
- 18 initially the plan, correct, which was to go in and take
- 19 property?
- 20 A Yes, sir.
- 21 Q But you knew someone was home when they opened the door,
- 22 right?
- 23 A The women came outside the home.
- 24 Q But this was not the first time you burglarized a home, was
- 25 it, in your life?

- 1 A No.
- 2 Q At your other burglaries, were people home or not home in
- 3 your past?
- 4 A They were not home.
- 5 Q So, why didn't you get the heck out of there when you knew
- 6 there were people home?
- 7 A I can't answer that. I was young, I made a bad decision, I
- 8 was in the wrong place at the wrong time.
- 9 Q The bad decision started out with you being around these
- 10 guys, right?
- 11 A Yes, sir.
- 12 Q You have a history of crime in the State of Connecticut; is
- 13 that right?
- 14 A Yes.
- 15 Q Is this your first New York State bid?
- 16 A Yes, sir.
- 17 Q Did you ever do any local time in New York State, prior to
- 18 this?
- 19 A No.
- 20 Q What did you do, once you heard the gunshots fired; because
- 21 several shots were fired and the victims were two women,
- 22 correct? There were children in the house; one child, I
- 23 believe, even witnessed a lot of this. Your codefendants --
- it is just such a heinous crime, sir, that you got yourself
- 25 involved in; that is the best way to describe it.

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- 1 A You are right. When I heard the shots --
- 2 Q Be honest with me, where were you physically when you heard
- 3 those gunshots go off?
- 4 A I was inside the van.
- 5 Q You were not in the house?
- 6 A No.
- 7 Q Was someone ever sexually molested?
- 8 A From what I heard, I wasn't there, I was not present to see
- 9 who did what, because I was inside the van. I did not go
- inside the dwelling, until after I heard the shots and I
- 11 realized there were children standing at the door. And
- 12 after a couple of them came down the stairs stating what
- 13 they just did, that is when I protected the children because
- I didn't want the children to get hurt.
- 15 Q How did you protect the children?
- 16 A I gathered them together and I sat them down on a stairwell
- somewhere in the kitchen area and I was talking to them and
- 18 told them I was not going to let nobody hurt them.
- 19 Q What kind of guns were these; handguns, shotguns, what?
- 20 A No. I believe one person had -- I believe Profit had a .22,
- I think he had a .22 and I think Ayala had a .38.
- 22 Q Now, we have your sentencing minutes on file. Did you see
- 23 the blood and --
- 24 A No, no; I didn't see any of it.
- 25 Q What made you gather the children into an area to calm them

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- 1 down; what possessed you to do that?
- 2 A When I heard those shots, it scared me because that was not
- 3 my intentions.
- 4 Q You knew they had guns going in though, didn't you? I mean
- 5 you drove there with them, didn't you?
- 6 A Yes.
- 7 Q You know with the felony murder rule, once you go in and you
- 8 are burglarizing a place and a felony is committed and then
- 9 a shooting happens and someone dies, you are attached to
- 10 that; that is what you are sitting in state prison for
- 11 today, right?
- 12 A You are right, you are right.
- 13 Q Now, you have been in since 1978, correct?
- 14 A Yes, sir.
- 15 Q And how long have you been in Attica for?
- 16 A Since 2007.
- 17 Q Where were you before that?
- 18 A I was in Wyoming Correctional Facility.
- 19 Q Since you have been in Attica, you have not had an
- 20 infraction, correct?
- 21 A Correct.
- 22 Q Your last infraction was in 2007, in Wyoming --
- 23 A Yes, sir.
- 24 Q -- for a weapon. So we are talking about pretty much seven
- years of good discipline, which is noted and to your credit.

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1		What has changed because you racked up some infractions
2		along your way here but once you got to Attica things have
3		been okay?
4	А	Well, the weapon that they claim was a weapon, to me was not
5		a weapon. I had a pair of glasses I had something on top
6		of a pen that I used to tighten the screw and they blew it
7		out of proportion and put a weapon label on it. I never had
8		a weapon, since I have been in the penitentiary. There
9		should be a photostatic copy of it in the records; it was
10		something on a pen, a writing pen that I used to tighten the
11		screw up. In order for me to the see the eye doctor, it
12		took months and months for me to get my glasses
13		fixed. In order to keep the screw in it, that is what it
14		was, it was something to keep the screw in my eyeglasses. I
15		never had a weapon in the penitentiary to bring any bodily
16		harm to anyone.
17	Q	What made you go from to New York, is there
18		family in New York that brought you here?
19	A	No, sir. No, I don't have any family members in New York.
20	Q	What were you doing back in the late '70s. You got out
21		your last time in jail, I believe, was back in 1974 in
22		right?
23	A	Yes, sir.
24	Q	So then you leave and you go to New York State; what were
25		you doing in New York State?

NYSID# 1 A I was with and 2 Q Pardon me? 3 I was with and Who is that? 4 0 5 COMM W. SMITH: Your codefendants? THE INMATE: Yes, sir. 6 7 Were you living with them? 8 A No. 9 Were they from too? 10 They picked me up off the street. Where were you living? 11 I was living in with my mother at the time, I 12 13 was visiting. 14 How far of a drive is it from your mom's to where the crime 15 was committed? 16 I can't say, per say, how many miles away from it it was. Was it an hour, two hours, eight hours? 17 18 It might have been an hour, hour and a half, maybe 19 forty-five minutes. 20 How long were you with them? I was only in the van for my recollection, I think maybe 21 A 22 only forty-five minutes, if it wasn't an hour. 23 So prior to this incident, you didn't know these guys? I knew back from the '60s; we used to go to school 24 25 together back in the '60s.

- 1 Q In
- 2 A Yes, sir.
- 3 Q Now, this is your seventh appearance?
- 4 A Seventh.
- 5 Q I just want to note that we have your COMPAS Risk
- Assessment, this is something new that we consider; at your
- 7 other appearances the COMPAS was not developed yet. It is a
- 8 tool we use to measure your risk and needs for success on
- 9 parole. Do you remember filling out the COMPAS
- 10 questionnaire for us?
- 11. A Yes, I did, to the best of my ability.
- 12 Q This is one of the things that we review, along with the
- various letters that you wrote to agencies for support.
- 14 It is noted the Osborne Association is what you are
- 15 interested in, correct?
- 16 A Yes, sir.
- 17 Q Sir, if you were able to walk out that door tomorrow, what
- 18 are your short-term plans?
- 19 A My short-term plans is to --
- 20 Q Where would you go and what would you do? I think you would
- 21 need a lot of support, you have been in there for a long
- 22 time and things have changed since the late '70s; that is
- 23 for sure.
- 24 A I realize that. As far as a place to go, I have five
- 25 addresses that I could live with, as far as relatives. My

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- 1 plan is to live with my mother because my mother needs my
- 2 help. From there, if I couldn't get employment right away,
- 3 I would get into a trade school; because before I got into
- 4 this trouble, my occupation was an auto technician.
- 5 Q How far did you get in school, before you got yourself in
- 6 trouble on this case? Did you get all the way through high
- 7 school on the outside?
- 8 A Tenth grade.
- 9 Q And what are you doing on a daily basis at Attica, what is
- your job assignment, what are you doing?
- 11 A I am a porter. But outside of porter, I am mostly reading
- 12 about my trade; I have a lot of books on auto technician and
- motorcycles. I am a mechanic, I used to be a mechanic.
- 14 Q So when you are saying you are a porter in Attica, what is
- 15 your shift?
- 16 A My shift is in the evening.
- 17 Q During the day you are pretty much free to do what you want?
- 18 A I am in my cell.
- 19 Q Of all the programs that you have completed through the
- years, what one do you feel was the most beneficial for you?
- 21 A The most beneficial?
- 22 Q Yes.
- 23 A The ASAT was beneficial to me.
- 24 Q In what facility did you take that at?
- 25 A Wyoming.

- 1 Q Wyoming?
- 2 A Yes.
- 3 Q Were you under the influence of drugs at all back then, sir,
- 4 back in the '70s?
- 5 A Back in the '70s, no. Back in the '60s I had a stick of
- 6 marijuana in my pocket.
- 7 Q That's it?
- 8 A But I was never like hooked or under the influence, I just
- 9 had it on my person.
- 10 Q And how long were you actually at this house before you guys
- 11 took off?
- 12 A Maybe twenty minutes, maybe twenty minutes, that I can
- 13 remember.
- 14 Q Were you offered a plea on this at all?
- 15 A Excuse me?
- 16 Q Did the district attorney offer you a plea, prior to going
- 17 to trial?
- 18 A Yes, he did.
- 19 Q What was it?
- 20 A He offered me fifteen years to life.
- 21 Q Looking back, why didn't you take it?
- 22 A Because at the time --
- 23 Q Instead of twenty-five years to life?
- 24 A At the time I wasn't aware of the law that he was trying to
- get me to confess to. When he said murder and I tried to

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explain to him that I didn't have any part of killing anyone 1 2 because I was not present inside the dwelling during the 3 time these women were killed. Yes, I was in the premises 4 but I did not go into the dwelling until after I heard the 5 shots. The attorney kept trying to convince me to cop out, 6 cop out, cop out. He kept throwing the word murder to me 7 and I didn't really understand the charge that I was being 8 charged with, until after I started going to the law library 9 and starting to understand exactly what felony murder was. Being young I was not familiar with the laws he was trying 10 to get me copped out to. 11 How many days passed before you were actually arrested on 12 0 13 this? 14 Three, three, I believe; I think it was three days. 15 Were you living -- during those three days, were you with 16 your codefendants? 17 A No. 18 You took off from them? 19 Yes, I did. 20 Were they bragging about what took place in the house? 21 Yes, they were. A 22 COMM. CRANGLE: Commissioners, any questions? 23 COMM W. SMITH: Why didn't you go to the police? 24 THE INMATE: Because I wanted to notify my relatives and my girlfriend what I had gotten into and then I was 25 Greater Rochester Court Reporting Service (585) 441-5184

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1 planning to turn myself in. 2 COMM W. SMITH: Why not right away, if what you say is 3 true? THE INMATE: Because I was afraid, I was afraid. 4 5 COMM W. SMITH: So were those children you were with, 6 right? THE INMATE: Yes, sir. COMM W. SMITH: No other questions. 8 9 COMM J. SMITH: I have nothing additional; thank you. 10 I have asked you a lot of questions, you have 11 answered everything. Is there anything you feel we missed 12 or anything you want to say on your own behalf that you feel 13 we have not covered with you? Yes, I would like to say something. Yes, I know the crime 14 15 is very heinous. I understand exactly the mess that I have 16 gotten myself into. Yes, I have made some bad decisions. 17 Yes, I realize I could have gone to the police immediately after this took place. Like I stated, by me being as young 18 19 as I was and fighting for what I had heard and understand 20 what two other people had did to two women, it places me in 21 a bad position. And like I have a great amount of remorse 22 pertaining to this situation that I am in and towards the 23 people, the lives that were lost and for the children that 24 are up there in age now and the ones -- the three that I saved. I cannot change what happened. 25

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1 Yes, I made a mistake, I was very young. But through 2 time and being incarcerated, I had a whole lot of time to 3 think about all the mess that I have gotten myself into, by being with the people I was with at the wrong time in my 4 5 life. I cannot change what happened in the past, I can only 6 try to do what I can to better myself and try to live a 7 respectful life. I have been away for a long time. What 8 can I possibly do to change what happened in the past; I 9 cannot change that. You can ask me a million questions, I 10 can only give you the answers to the best of my ability. I 11 am human, I made a mistake, I am sorry for it. What else 12 can I possibly do? 13 I thought I was doing the right thing after I realize 14 people were getting killed, to save the children; that is 15 why I did what I did and got them away from it. After I got 16 out of that van, I was hysterical. I know how -- I understand the crime is a very heinous crime. I know lives 17 18 were taken. I understand from what they told me, what they 19 did and their raping and the drinking their liquor that they 20 was doing; I understand all of that. My thinking, my intentions was not to kill anybody. 21 COMM W. SMITH: You had been involved in a lot of 22 23 breaking and entering prior to this? 24 THE INMATE: A lot, you say?

COMM W. SMITH: Yes.

1	THE INMATE: Did you say a lot?
2	COMM W. SMITH: Yes. How many prior burglaries had you
3	done?
4	THE INMATE: I believe that I was involved in three of
5	them.
6	COMM W. SMITH: So you did three prior burglaries.
. 7	Were you the mastermind? You said you didn't know these
8	guys real well, but you were already experienced in
9	burglary; were you the mastermind of setting this up?
10	THE INMATE: No, sir; no, I wasn't.
11	COMM W. SMITH: Who was?
12	THE INMATE: I was picked up off the street. From my
13	understanding, it was supposed to be was supposed to
14	be the mastermind, as far as my recollection.
15	COMM W. SMITH: What did he say to you to get you to go
16	along?
17	THE INMATE: He said that he knew some spots that he
18	could get some money from.
19	COMM W. SMITH: You had already engaged in burglary
20	activity; it wasn't a mistake, you knew what burglary was.
21	THE INMATE: Yes, I knew what burglary was.
22	COMM W. SMITH: All right thank; you.
23	COMM. CRANGLE: All right, sir; thanks for coming in.

- 1	<u>DECISION</u>
2	Denied twenty-four months; next appearance 11/15.
3	After a careful review of your record, your personal
4.	interview and deliberation, parole is denied.
5	Your institutional accomplishments and release plans are
6	noted. Required statutory factors have been considered,
7	including your risk to the community, rehabilitation efforts and
8	your needs for successful reintegration into the community.
9	This Panel remains concerned, however, about the serious,
10	brutal nature of your instant offenses and your lengthy history
11	of unlawful conduct; which when considered with required and
12	relevant factors, leads to the conclusion that if released at
13	this time, there is a reasonable probability that you will not
14	live and remain at liberty without violating the law. Your
15	release at this time is incompatible with the welfare and safety
16	of the community. Your discretionary release at this time would
17	so deprecate the serious nature of the crime, as to undermine
18	respect for the law.
