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
Parole Interview Transcript/Decision - FUSL000010 (2015-11-18)

1.	COMM. ALEXANDER: Good morning.
2	THE INMATE: Good morning.
3	COMM. ALEXANDER: Could you state your name,
4	sir?
5	THE INMATE: My name is
6	COMM. ALEXANDER: Mr. my name is
7	Commissioner Alexander. I am joined today by
8	Commissioner Hernandez.
9	COMM. HERNANDEZ: Hello, sir.
10	BY COMMISSIONER ALEXANDER:
11	Q. We are here for your reappearance; is that
12	correct, sir?
13	A. Yes, it is.
14	Q. I know that you have had seven full interviews;
15	is that correct?
16	A. Yes.
17	Q. I don't believe I've ever met you. I believe
18	Commissioner Hernandez might have been on an earlier
19	panel of yours. I don't believe she has ever
20	interviewed you. I could be wrong. I've tried to read
21	most of that material.
22	In any event, I am not bound, nor is she bound,
23	by anything that was said in the past. Our job here,
24	today, is to evaluate whether you are a good candidate
25	for parole.

Unfortunately, or fortunately, as the case might
 be, we need to re-examine some of the issues that you
 have been asked about many times.

I want to give you an opportunity to explain the crime which brought you here, the changes in rehabilitation that you have worked on, since you have been in prison, and what would be your plans, if you were released. Okay?

9 A. Yes.

Q. Now, my records indicate that you are here for the crimes of Murder, Second, two counts; Robbery, First, four counts; Burglary, Second; as well as Grand Larceny, Auto, Third. I believe there was a plea and you were resentenced.

A. Yes. I had a reversal. They tried me over thesecond time, same from the first.

17 Q. So when you were re-sentenced, that was by 18 verdict?

19 A. Yes.


20 Q. And why did you get the reversal?

A. They claimed that they obtained a confession from me outside of my lawyer, that I didn't have at the time. I didn't have a lawyer.

24. They held me incommunicado for a certain amount 25 of hours, and they claimed that the original confession

The Sentencing Minutes that I have in your file 3 , 1981, and they were before are dated 4 Was that the sentencing judge? 5 A. Yes. 6 And that was the judge who presided over that 0. 7 retrial; is that correct? 8 A. Correct. Q. My records indicate that you, and your two 9 10 co-defendants, entered a house. Two females were 11 discovered dead. They had been raped, not by you. There were four children in the house. There were a 12 13 number of gunshots and victims' property was taken. 14 You were arrested in 15 You had a revolver and you had a suitcase, which belonged to a neighbor of the victim, who had been 16 17 burglarized prior to this crime. 18 What was your role in this crime? 19 I was supposed to have been an accomplice, being Α. 20 picked up off the streets, to a crime. 21 I didn't know that anybody was going to get killed. I didn't have any knowledge of rape. I didn't 22 23 know that children were involved, until I got out of the van, and went into the house, after I heard shots. 24 25 Q. Let's back up a minute. I want to make sure I

1 Q. Did you enter the house?

2 A. After I heard the shots.

3 Q. So you heard gunshots, you entered the house, and 4 what did you do?

5 A. At the time I realized, at the front door, the 6 entrance of the house, there were four children there.

7 At that time I heard and the other guy 8 come down the stairs. They was laughing and yelling 9 about what had happened.

10 My understanding, from the gunshots, I asked them 11 did they shoot somebody? They said, yes, they shot two 12 women.

I said to them that I couldn't allow them to shoot these kids, that were standing at the door, so I protected the kids.

I rounded up the kids with me, and I went to the back of the house, and I sat down and held the children with me.

19 Q. Did you ever use a knife?

20 A. Yes, I did.

21 Q. What did you use the knife for?

A. I used the knife to disable a vehicle that was inthe garage.

24 Q. What do you mean you disabled them?

25 A. I struck one of the tires.

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NYSID # DIN # Why did you do that? 1 0. To disable the vehicle, in case somebody was 2 Α. coming after us. 3 4 Q. Did the kids see you with the knife? A. I don't know. I can't remember, offhand, if they 5 6 saw me or not. 7 I picked up the knife, after I sat the children 8 down. I left them in the kitchen area. I went through 9 the garage area, and I disabled the tire. I put the knife down, and I came back to the 10 11 kids, and I told the kids that I wasn't gonna let nobody 12 harm them. 13 The other two were going through the house, doing 14 whatever they was doing, and then they told me it was 15 time to leave. 16 I told the kids I wasn't gonna let them harm you, and I told them to sit here until somebody comes to 17 18 their aid. Q. So did you leave with and the other guy? 19 20 A. Yes, I did. Q. Where did you go? 21 A. I went to 22 23 Q. So did you call the police, or you allowed four young kids to discover their two mothers dead? 24 25 A. No, I didn't call the police. I wanted to get M & F Reporting Service (845) 562-5190

8 NYSID # DIN # 1 back to so I could notify my fiancée what I was involved in, and I was going to turn myself in. 2 3 Q. Did you turn yourself in? 4 Α. No, I didn't. They came to our home and arrested 5 me. 6 What do you think about this crime, so many years Q. 7 later? It was a very brutal crime, a heinous crime, 8 Α. 9 something that should never have happened. 10 It's been a long time. I lost a lot of years out 11 of my life. I was in the wrong place, at the wrong 12 time, with the wrong people. I think about this every day, of every year, I can possibly think of this. 13 14 I was willing to admit to some crimes, but as far 15 as killing and shooting people, raping people, I can 16 never admit to something I didn't do. 17 I've always admitted to having knowledge, that's 18 all I can give forth, as far as the information that I 19 partake in this crime. 20 Q. Prior to the original plea, I know you were resentenced, but were you ever offered a different plea 21 22 arrangement? 23 A. Yes. 24 0. What was that? 25 A. Fifteen years to life. 1 Q. And why didn't you take that?

A. Because they wanted me to copout to shooting the people. I told my lawyer that I couldn't copout to that, because I had no knowledge of what took place at the time of the people getting raped and the gunshots, because I wasn't inside.

7 I was outside in the van, so I can't say who 8 killed who or who shot who. I just witnessed that I 9 heard shots, and what I heard, from what they were 10 saying, when they came down the stairs.

Q. I'd like to move on to what efforts you have made towards your rehabilitation. As we discussed, you have been in prison a very long time.

I see that your discipline record is good. You have not had a ticket since 2007, but in 2007 you did have some serious issues. You had a weapon, as well as drug possession.

18 Was there something about Wyoming, which was 19 problematic for you?

A. I wouldn't say that I had a problem. The weapon that they claimed was a weapon, was not a weapon. As far as the drug issue, it wasn't mine.

I was living in an open setting. I wasn't there.
I never saw the substance. I never had a drug problem.
They wanted me out of the dorm, because I guess

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1	it was one of those things that the dorm officer and I,
2	we didn't get along. We didn't see eye to eye.
3	Q. Since that point you have had no issues; is that
4	correct?
5	A. Correct.
6	Q. Prior to this crime, how many burglaries did you
7	commit?
8	A. Two.
9	Q. You committed two or you were convicted on two?
10	A. I was convicted of one back in the early '60s. I
11	got arrested for being in a stolen car.
12	Q. Have you ever committed any other burglaries,
13	where you hadn't gotten caught?
14	A. No.
15	Q. If you were released, what are your plans? Where
16	would you live? What would you do for work?
17	A. As far as living, I can live with my sister. She
18	lives in
19	Job issues would be, I'm an auto mechanic by
20	trade. I went to a couple of trade schools back in the
21	'60s and '70s.
22	My issue is to get back into a dealership,
23	working on cars and trucks and bikes.
24	Q. Now, I did relate that we have the Sentencing
25	Minutes from your retrial. We will take those into

1 account. I believe we also have the indictment from 2 1978.

I do want to go over your COMPAS Risk Assessment with you, which we use as a tool to see what your needs might be out in the community if you were released.

6 The COMPAS shows your risk levels are low. I 7 don't foresee any problems, based upon the COMPAS. It 8 shows your financial prospects are good, and that you 9 have good family support. We will take that into 10 account.

In terms of your Case Plan, it did say that your goals were to prepare for your Parole Board and develop anger management strategies. I believe that we will take this into account, as well.

You said you were going to read books on the subject of -- I'm not sure what. Did you mean you were qoing to read books on auto mechanics?

18 A. Yes.

19 Q. How has that been going for you?

A. It's been going well. I just need to get more material, so I can understand the electronic issues of today's product.

Q. Do you have an alternative residence, if you're not accepted for interstate transfer?

25 A. Yes, I do. It's not at the same residence. It's

3	Q. No. What I'm saying is has to accept
4	you. If you are not accepted, what would be your plans
5	in New York?
6	A. I would have to go to a shelter.
7	Q. Have you contacted any programs in the New York
8	City area?
9	A. I contacted the Osborne Association. They are
10	willing to place me in a housing unit, as well as
11	Exodus.
12	Q. I see a letter from Osborne, as well as Fortune
13	Society. I also see a letter from Network Support
14	Services. Correct, sir?
15	A. Yes, ma'am.
16	COMM. ALEXANDER: Commissioner Hernandez, do
17	you have any questions?
18	COMM. HERNANDEZ: I do not.
19	BY COMMISSIONER ALEXANDER:
20	Q. Mr. anything else we should know about
21	you, that could help us with our parole decision, that
22	we have not talked about today?
23	A. I just want you to understand that I'm not
24	twenty-four-years old anymore. I'm not that dumb kid
25	that was in the wrong place, at the wrong time, with the

wrong individuals.

I have a high amount of remorse towards this
crime I was involved in. I just want you to understand
that I'm admitting my guilt to some of the crime that
took place, after the immediate crime, and I'm very
sorry for that.

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7 Q. What does remorse mean to you?

A. It means that I feel sorrow within my heart that 9 these little children had to witness this crime towards 10 their mother being killed, and me being in a place I 11 wasn't invited, and for these kids to grow up and feel 12 what I haven't felt, as my mother being killed by a 13 bunch of clowns.

14 I'm suffering as well as they are. I know
15 they're suffering a great deal more than I am. It's
16 something I can't change.

17. I feel very, very belittled by being involved in 18 this situation. As far as these children having to grow 19 up without their mother, that's a feeling I could never 20 feel, as far as somebody killing my mother.

21 COMM. HERNANDEZ: I do have a question.
22 BY COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ:

23 Q. Have you ever had any contact with any of those 24 children?

25 A. Yes, I have.

2	A. I believe it was 2003 or 2004, came
3	to visit me.
4	Q. And what happened?
5	A. He came to visit me to see if he could seek
6	information on why see and see and killed his mother.
. 7	I told him I couldn't answer that, because I had no idea

9	Q. What do you think about him coming to visit you?
10	A. It took a lot of courage for him to come in to
11	see me again, from him being so small.
12	He was a little kid. I didn't identify with him,
13	until he brought things back to my recollection. He
14	told me he was the little boy standing by the door.
15	Q. Yes. How tragic.
16	A. Yes.
17	Q. And I agree with you, it took a lot of courage.
18	A. Yes, it did.
19	Q. You have no further contact with him?
20	A. No. I haven't seen him since 2004. He stopped
21	coming to see me, after I told him I couldn't give him
22	anymore information towards what I thought the reason
23	was why and killed his mother.
24	Q. Did you say anything else to him?
25	A. No, I didn't. I told him I was very sorry.

6	BY COMMISSIONER ALEXANDER:	
5	Q. Where did you get the knife, that you used to	
8	disable the tires?	
9	A. It was on the counter in the kitchen.	
10	Q. Anything else you want to say, sir?	
11	A. No, I don't.	
12	COMM. ALEXANDER: We are going to look at	
13	everything and get back to you in writing in a couple of	
14	days. Thank you for coming in.	
15	THE INMATE: Thank you.

3	COMM. ALEXANDER: parole is
4	denied, 24 months. Next appearance, 11/17.
5	This Panel notes your growth and productive use of
6	time, however, discretionary release shall not be
7	granted merely as a reward for good conduct or efficient
8	performance of duties while confined.
9	After carefully reviewing your record and
10	conducting a personal interview, parole is denied.
11	You stand convicted of the serious offense of
12	multiple counts of Murder Second, Robbery First, and
13	Burglary Second, and Grand Larceny-Auto, Third, in
14	connection with your actions, wherein two women were
15	raped and shot, with four children in the home.
16	You described your role as a lookout during a
17	robbery, which went terribly wrong, and you fled the
18	scene, and was arrested out of state.
19	This offense represents a continuation of your
20	criminal history, which includes a prior burglary.
21	The Panel makes note of your program goals and
22	accomplishments; including your completion of
23	vocational, A-SAT, and ART, risk and needs assessment,
24	and your improved disciplinary record, which has been
25	clean since 2007.

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Also your release plans, letters of assurance,
 shallow expression of remorse, and Sentencing Minutes,
 have been reviewed and considered.

During the interview you minimized your responsibility for your actions and the harm that you caused these families, which shall ever be impacted by your actions that day.

8 After deliberating, reviewing your overall record 9 and statutory factors, discretionary release is not 10 presently warranted, as your release would trivialize 11 the tragic loss of life, and harm, and furthermore would 12 be incompatible with the welfare of society, and would 13 so deprecate the serious nature of your crime as to 14 undermine respect for the law.
