1	EXAMINATION BY COMMISSIONER MANLEY:
2	Q
3	A Yes, sir.
4	Q I am Commissioner Manley. Commissioner Smith,
5	Commissioner Lazzari.
6	COMMISSIONER SMITH: Hello.
7	COMMISSIONER LAZZARI: Hello.
8	A Hello.
9	Q Sir, this is your initial appearance before the
10	Parole Board. You are here for a burglary first degree. You
11	got ten to life, you pled guilty. And here you are, ten years
12	later. Did you ever think you would spend this much time at
13	one stretch in prison?
14	A No.
15	Q No. Well, you know why you got hit like this, is
16	because of your record. In this case, the instant offense,
17	you, in concert with two others, entered set 's
18	apartment, you were armed with pistols, and forcibly stole the
19	victim's property. During the course of the offense, you
20	struggled with the victim, you dragged her and her
21	eight-year-old son into the bedroom, attempted to tie her hands
22	with the bed sheet, put a pistol to her head, cocked it, and
23	said you were going to kill her. That's what the record says.
24	Anything you want to add to that?
25	A Well, I never was tried, charged with no pistol. I
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1	did went to the apartment, yes.	
2	Q You did go to the apartment. Who had the pistol?	
3	A We went to the apartment.	
4	Q Who had the pistol?	
5	A .	
6	Q What part did you play in this?	
7	A I went and I was right there by the door. And like	
8	five minutes later, the police came.	
9	Q You never touched her, never touched the children?	
10	A No.	
11	Q She fabricated all that?	
12	A She didn't fabricate all that. The statement when we	
13	went to court, she specify everything everyone, every single	
14	person, was doing. And like, was holding the kid,	
15	playing with the kid, playing the video. She went to the back	
16	room with to get the money.	
17	Q How old were you when this happened, when you did	
18	this?	
19	A When, now?	
20	Q No, then.	
21	A Ten years ago.	
22	Q How old are you now?	
23	A Thirty-six.	
24	Q Then you were 26, that's good math. I look at your	
25	record, it goes back to '83. Y.O. attempted petit larceny, got	
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1	a year of probation. Before the probation was up, you were
2	adjudicated as Y.O. for robbery first degree, you got a year in
3	jail. You were also adjudicated for Y.O. rob two, and you got
4	another year in jail, just running consecutive, I mean
5	concurrent. This is in '84. You get out, and you got
6	convicted of rob two in '86, you get 18 to 54 months. Got
7	paroled, your parole was revoked. Criminal trespassing. You
8	have additional attempted burglary in '89, time served, five
9	years probation. You violated, they resentenced you to 30
10	months to five years prison. They give you a break and put you
11	in a work release program, and you abscond. And you were
12	returned as an absconder, you get paroled, and you max out.
13	Get on parole and you well, given this kind of record, why
14	would you think that we should give you a break? Do you think
15	that, I mean, the record says that you are going to get out
16	there and do what you have been doing, because this is what you
17	know how to do. That's what it says. Despite all the
18	influences of the justice system, despite the prison sentences,
19	despite parole, despite probation, you are going to do what you
20	want to do, when you want to do it, and if it hurts other
21	people, so what? Is that the case?
22	A That's what my record says.
23	Q That's what your record says. What do you say?
24	A I think I, what I really say, that I know I hurt some
25	people, I know that. It's my conscience, in my heart, I know
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1	that I did that. And if I could stop the time, go back, it
2	would never happen. But I know I made bad choices, and right
3	now I am paying the consequences.
4	Q Right, you certainly are. Ten years is not chump
5	change. How many years have you spent in prison all together,
6	if you added it all up?
7	A That's close to twenty.
8	Q Twenty years. You have spent more years in prison
9	than you have in the larger community. Mr.
10	have any support out there?
11	A I got work, like work.
12	Q For support?
13	A Family?
14	Q Family.
15	A I have my sister, my mother.
16	Q Sister and mother. What kind of work can you do?
17	A Electrical.
18	Q Electrical work? You have some skills in that area?
19	A Yes, sir.
20	Q Did you have it before you came to prison?
21	A Mm-hmm.
22	Q Yeah? I see that you were a general mechanic in
23	maintenance. You completed ART, right?
24	A Yes, sir.
25	Q You are working as electrician right now?
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1	A Mm-hmm.
2	Q All right. You have one Tier II infraction. Is that
3	one Tier II in ten years?
4	A Yes, sir.
5	Q That's impressive. And that's for creating a
6	disturbance. How did you manage to do that? It takes some
7	skills to stay away from getting tickets. How did you do that?
8	A Being most of the time reading. Go to the work in
9	the morning, I go to work at 7:30 in the morning, I come back
10	at 3:30.
11	Q Somebody jump in your face and want to take something
12	from you, how do you deal with that?
13	A Now, these days?
14	Q Yeah.
15	A Now, most of the time, just talk about it, and walk
16	away from it.
17	Q Mm-hmm. What are you going to do with your life,
18	sir, when you get out there?
19	A Get my job, I got to get a job, support myself, get
20	work. And first of all, I got to live with my sister. I
21	can't, I don't have no other place to go. I got to save to get
22	my apartment. And I really want to renew with my son, my son
23	is going to be 20 years old now.
24	Q All right. Did you have a drug problem?
25	A No, sir. No drugs.
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1	COMMISSIONER MANLEY: Commissioners, any
2	questions?
3	COMMISSIONER LAZZARI: No questions.
4	COMMISSIONER SMITH: No questions.
5	Q All right. Sir, what you have going for you, you
6	spent a lot of time in prison. What's against you is your
7	record, because you have had repeat offenses. What you also
8	have going for you is the fact that you only have one ticket in
9	ten years, it shows some skills, it shows you can be focused.
10	So we'll consider all of that and get back to you. Thank you.
11	A Thank you, sir. Have a good day.
12	(Whereupon the Commissioners deliberated off the
13	record.)
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1	DECISION
2	COMMISSIONER MANLEY: Twenty-four months.
3	MR. MOLIK: 10/06.
4	COMMISSIONER MANLEY: 10/06.
5	Parole is denied for the following reasons:
6	After a careful review of your record and this interview, it is
7	the determination of this Panel that, if released at this time,
8	there is a reasonable probability that you would not live and
9	remain at liberty without violating the law, and your release
10	at this time is incompatible with the welfare and safety of the
. 11	community. This decision is based on the following factors:
12	The instant offense, burglary first degree, involved you
13	stealing property from your victim. In the course of the
14	burglary, you and codefendants stole the victim's property.
15	You and your codefendant dragged the victim and her
16	eight-year-old son to a bedroom, and tried to tie the victim's
17	hands to the bed. We note you placed a gun to her head and
18	told her you were going to kill her. The instant offense
19	reflects a pattern of burglary-and-robbery-related offenses.
20	We are aware of your positive institutional adjustment, but we
21	believe your release at this time is not in the best interest
22.	of the community.
23	He is above the guideline, sentence structure,
24	crime involved weapon usage, pattern of similar offenses.
25	(Whereupon Commissioner Smith and Commissioner Lazzari
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	1	concurred.)
