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1	EXAMI	INATION BY COMMISSIONER W. SMITH:
2	Q	Good afternoon. Would you state your name for the
3		record, please?
4	А	
5	Q	Very good. Mr.
6		Smith joined today by Commissioner Alexander on my right
7		and Commissioner Julie Smith on my left. You are
8		reappearing today continuing to serve a sentence of ten
9		to life for burglary in the first degree; is that
10		correct?
11	A	Yes, sir.
12	Q	We have a lot of things we look at as we determine
13		whether now is an appropriate time for you to go into
14		the community. How old are you, sir?
15	A	46.
16	Q	And how many years of that 46 years have you served
17		inside New York State prison?
18	A	20.
19	Q.	That's on this instant offense, right?
20	А	Yes.
21	Q	You've spent more than that. What about prior to
22		offenses?
23	A	Probably like 28.
24	Q	A long time. The majority of your life, right?
25	A	Yes.

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Is this what you had hoped to grow up and spend your Q days sitting inside a state prison? А No. 0 Do you remember way back in I think it was 1983 you had a youthful offender adjudication for attempted petty larceny; do you remember that? A Yes. We don't always have your old records. We actually have 0 yours that go way back and I'll tell you why. It's because pretty much you've either been on supervision or -- either on supervision or in state prison since the since the 80s, correct? Yes, sir. A I actually have this attempted petty larceny, that's 0 what you were convicted of. It started off with burglary petty larceny stolen property and this was in , right? Α Yes. ; do you remember him? You and accomplice 0 A Yes. You broke into the van, stole some items; is that right? Q A Yes, sir.

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Q What an opportunity the judge gave you. A year
probation youthful offender attempted petty larceny.
Back in '83 if you would have completed that you would

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1		have been home free, wouldn't you?
2	A	Yes, sir.
3	Q	Why didn't you stop doing crime?
4	A	I was selfish and thinking more about myself than
5		anybody else.
6	Q	Now you have the opportunity to serve the rest of your
7		lifetime in state prison. I don't know if that will
8		happen but that's your opportunity now, right?
9	A	No, sir. I hope not.
10	Q	Well, it is. Whether we release you today you still
11		have a life sentence. That nasty four letter word.
12		Then you're arrested in May of '84. I've got that
13		pre-sentence report. It's kind of amazing that we have
14		stuff that's this old. You told the complainant, this
15		was ; do you remember that? There was
16		a man playing golf and you told the complainant don't
17		say anything or you would stuff the sticks down his
18		throat; do you remember that?
19	A	Playing golf?
20	Q	Well, it might have been ḋid you approach it says
21		near a dirt trail the three defendants approached the
22		complainant on their bikes armed with chuka sticks; do
23		you remember that?
24	A	Yes.
25	Q	It's a long time ago. You probably don't remember

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1 everything about it but that was a youthful offender 2 robbery first so you got local jail for that. Then in 3 '86 you were arrested March 19th of '85 and you got a 4 robbery second. You went to state prison for the first 5 time for that, right? 6 A Yes, sir. 7 I've got that in front of me too. Then while you were 0 8 on parole supervision you had a misdemeanor that they 9 didn't violate you for but while you were on parole you 10 committed the next offense an attempt of burglary second 11 led to probation, correct? 12 Yes, sir. A 13 I've got a copy of that. You violated probation. You Q 14 ultimately went to state prison, got released and when 15 you were on parole you committed this instant offense, 16 right? 17 A Yes. 18 Where did you get the handgun from? 0 19 The handgun? A 20 In the instant offense? Q 21 It came from my co-defendant. A 22 And you and your co-defendants went into a home, 0 23 displayed that pistol, attempted to tie a female up in 24 front of her eight year-old son and took property, 25 right?

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1 Α Yes. 2 0 You were on parole at the time -- you were on parole at 3 the time and that parole expired prior to sentencing. 4 Basically what we do is cancel delinquency maximum 5 expiration but you got another sentence. You were on 6 parole when you had the handgun, right? 7 A Yes, sir. 8 How did you choose the particular place that you were Q 9 burglarizing? 10 A Excuse me. 11 0 How did you choose the place you had burglarized in the 12 instant offense? 13 A It was random. 14 It's not a home of a drug dealer that you told us 0 15 before? 16 It was. Α 17 0 Come on. When you shrug your shoulder the verbal 18 message I got was oh, I just got caught telling a 19 different story. Now you tell me what actually I should 20 take from your mannerism? 21 A When we went there it used to be a drug dealer's. 22 So stop right there. Why did you just tell me it was Q 23 random? Why did you tell me that? 24 Because every time I try telling the truth of what A 25 really happened, it's like nobody wants to understand

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1		it.
2	Q	Do you know who Pinocchio is?
3	А	Yes.
4	Q	Well, it doesn't help to have differing accounts. I'm
5		not saying you're Pinocchio, but it doesn't help to have
6		deferring accounts. There's this thing I think you
7		probably heard of it before. Deprecate the seriousness
8		of the crime undermine respect for the law; you've heard
9		of that, right?
10	А	Yes.
11	Q	We should talk about that because that's something we
12		have to at least look at. When we look at your risk and
13		needs assessment many things are low risk. Your risk of
14		in terms of family support is low because you have a
15		place to stay, this in and
16		that's good. Your highest area of concern is risk of
17		violence, you're an eight out of ten. When we look at
18		this deprecate the seriousness of the crime undermine
19		respect for the law you can sort of paraphrase it as
20		saying if we release who has his third
21		state prison term, a history of weapons, a history of
22		violence, bad history on probation, bad history on
23		parole, would the community say it would deprecate the
24		seriousness of the crime and undermine respect for the
25		law. In other words would they say what are we doing

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1 releasing this man? And so it's important for us to 2 hear what you have to say as to why you should be 3 released.

A I believe that I have grown up in the last 20 years of
being incarcerated. I take full responsibility for what
I've done. The pain that I suffer for that little boy.
I hope he grow up to be a good man and at one time he
forgive me, you know?

9 Q Certainly we will consider that. You had some positives 10 besides a place to stay. You've done a number of 11 programs including some violence programs, right?

12 A Yes.

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13 Q So we weigh that. We look to see what have you done to 14 minimize your risk. Your behavior earlier on was a 15 struggle. You did have some disciplinary violations, 16 but I think you've been disciplinary free since July of 17 2008 if I'm correct; is that right?

18 A Yes.

19 Okay. You have some positives, some things that are not Q 20 as positive. We're going to look at all of those. We 21 don't have a copy of the sentencing minutes. They were 22 requested and the courts were not able to provide those. 23 We have some letters supporting your release. I 24 mentioned [phonetic]. She has a very 25 helpful letter. She writes a nice letter that gives us

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FUSL000058 an indication of your relationship to her. She is your 2 Godmother; is that right? 3 A Yes. 4 And willing to help you. You also have reached out to 0 5 Buffalo Employment and Training Center, One Stop 6 Services and Back to Basic Industries. They help ex --7 offenders. We're familiar with Buffalo Employment and 8 Training Center and also the Buffalo Urban League you've 9 reached out to in past. I've asked you a lot of 10 questions. COMMISSIONER W. SMITH: Commissioner Alexander or 12 Commissioner Julie Smith, any questions? COMMISSIONER ALEXANDER: I have nothing further. 14 COMMISSIONER J. SMITH: I have nothing additional. Thank you very much. 16 0 Anything else, Mr. that you want to tell us today?

18 Yes. I would like to address the panel that besides --А 19 I know that my history is really bad, but I believe that 20 I grew up. I'm not the same person that I was 20 years 21 ago. I don't see life now like it's just me. I see 22 people around me. I know I can contribute to society if 23 you give me a chance. 24 0 All right. We'll let must know in writing. Thank you

25 for coming in.

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(After due deliberation by the Parole Board Panel, the following Decision was rendered:)

DECISION

5 Denied. Hold 24 months. Next appearance 8/2016. Parole denied after a personal interview, record 6 7 review and deliberation. This panel determines that 8 release at this time would so deprecate the seriousness 9 of your offense as to undermine respect for the law. 10 Required statutory factors have been considered 11 including your risk to the community, rehabilitation 12 efforts and your needs for successful community 13 reintegration.

14 You history of violence is significant. You had a 15 probation sentence in 1983 for a youthful offender 16 adjudication for attempted petty larceny. Your first 17 sentence of local time was imposed to a 1984 youthful 18 offender robbery first adjudication. Your first state 19 sentence for robbery second in 1986 was followed by a 20 burglary second and eventually the instant offense of 21 burglary first.

This panel finds your release is incompatible withthe public safety and welfare.
