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- 1 COMM. SMITH: Good evening, sir. State your
- 2 name for the record.
- THE INMATE:
- 4 COMM. SMITH: Good afternoon. I am
- 5 Commissioner Smith. I am joined today by Commissioners
- 6 Coppola and Sharkey.
- 7 COMM. SHARKEY: Hello.
- 8 COMM. COPPOLA: Hello, sir.
- 9 BY COMMISSIONER SMITH:
- 10 Q. You come before us today as a reappearance. The
- 11 record indicates that you are presently incarcerated
- 12 serving fifteen-to-life, following a conviction by plea
- 13 in County, for Murder, Second; is that right?
- 14 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 15 Q. We have your Sentencing Minutes on file.
- 16 This offense dates back to of 1992, so
- 17 twenty-three years ago. You caused the death of a
- 18 twenty-year-old female, by either throwing her or
- 19 pushing her from a rooftop; is that correct?
- 20 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 21 Q. You were on parole at the time for a Robbery,
- 22 First, adjudication, and a Robbery, Second, conviction.
- 23 This is your second time in State prison.
- 24 A. Yes.
- Q. Tell me about that day. Who was this young

- 1 woman? How did this unfold?
- 2 A. The young woman was a friend of mine for quite
- 3 some time.
- 4 But if I can start from the beginning. When I
- 5 did the first conviction, I did two years as a YO for
- 6 robbery, accessory to robbery. I came home. Then her
- 7 and I got into the habit of just hanging out and going
- 8 places.
- 9 On this particular day she happened to be driving
- 10 me around in her vehicle, at which time I was under the
- 11 impression it was her vehicle. I later found out that
- 12 the vehicle belonged to her boyfriend. He was not too
- 13 happy about that, so he and I got into an altercation.
- I believe she was twenty-eight, and he was like
- 15 thirty-two.
- 16 So we got into an altercation, which is an
- 17 altercation that I lost. So being that I lost, and I
- 18 was in need of getting revenge, I went to get some of my
- 19 friends to retaliate against this guy, which is when the
- 20 victim, said she wanted to talk to me.
- 21 So we go upstairs to talk. In the process I
- 22 wasn't trying to hear anything, other than getting
- 23 revenge. So she somehow hits me and pushes me, and she
- 24 keeps hitting me.
- Me, not thinking about it, not conscious of my

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- 1 being a little bit bigger, I push her, and in the
- 2 process of me pushing her, it led to her falling off.
- 3 Some two months later, I was picked up for it.
- 4 Q. So if you wanted to talk, why would you not stay
- 5 on the street? Why walk to the rooftop?
- A. Because that was like a regular hangout of her's,
- 7 at that time. That's where a lot of people went to hang
- 8 out, get high, do whatever.
- 9 Q. How tall was the building?
- 10 A. Six stories.
- 11 Q. So she fell six stories. Was she deceased upon
- 12 impact?
- 13 A. From what I was told, yes.
- 14 Q. So she has gone over the edge. What happens
- 15 next?
- 16 A. I go down, and I went home. I was scared,
- 17 because this was not something that was planned to
- 18 happen. It just happened. So being scared, I went
- 19 home.
- Q. Did you check on her? Did you call an anonymous
- 21 call-in for an ambulance or for anybody to come?
- 22 A. No, because I was afraid.
- Q. She was your friend, you said.
- 24 A. Yes. But I was just released from prison for
- 25 some time, I was on parole at the time, so I was scared.

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- 1 Q. So your morals of taking care of your friend
- 2 didn't kick in?
- 3 A. Fear superceded all that, at that moment.
- 4 Q. What do you think now, when you look back on this
- 5 twenty-three years later?
- 6 A. I regret that entire day. I regret everything.
- 7 At the time, if I'd known better, and if I was
- 8 rationally thinking, I actually would have called and
- 9 reported it, and explained the entire situation as being
- 10 something that was accidental.
- 11 Q. It looks like you got arrested a couple of months
- 12 later.
- 13 A. Yes.
- 14 Q. How did they pin it on you?
- 15 A. Someone said they saw me. They never said
- 16 anything, but when someone offered a reward, they spoke
- 17 up and said they saw me.
- 18 Q. As discussed, this is your second time in State
- 19 prison. Your prior bid was a YO for Robbery, First,
- 20 that you got two-to-six on; and then you got two-to-six,
- 21 also, at the same time, for Robbery, Second.
- Now, you've had no discipline since 2010. Your
- 23 last ticket was at Mid Orange, and it was a Tier II; is
- 24 that correct, sir?
- 25 A. Yes.

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- 1 Q. In fact, in reviewing your entire disciplinary
- 2 record, I only see one Tier III, which was back in 1995,
- 3 so twenty years ago.
- 4 You COMPAS Risk Assessment shows you have a low
- 5 risk of violence, arrest and absconding. No reported
- 6 issues with substances on the outside.
- 7 You're planning to reside with your wife in
- 8 ?
- 9 A. Yes.
- 10 Q. We have the Parole packet that was sent in from
- 11 your wife in support of you, along with your
- 12 certificates of accomplishment, programming you have
- 13 done, letters of support and family photos. You have a
- 14 lovely family.
- 15 A. Thank you.
- 16 Q. It looks like your wife has a catering business;
- 17 is that true?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 Q. You are hoping to do some work for that catering?
- 20 A. For a period of time.
- Q. It looks like you are into crafts and crocheting;
- 22 is that true?
- 23 A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. Well, that's very nice. That's some good work.
- 25 A. Thank you.

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- 1 Q. What would you propose for work, otherwise? How
- 2 would you support yourself?
- 3 A. For the time being?
- 4 Q. No, long term.
- 5 A. To be honest with you I have had offers in the
- 6 past, but this being my sixth parole, people tend to not
- 7 want to be bothered anymore. They say when you get out,
- 8 come see me, give me a call, things of that nature.
- 9 I'm not one to be picky at the moment, whatever
- 10 it takes for me to help support my family.
- 11 Q. We have your resumé here. You did a nice job on
- 12 that, as well.
- 13 Letters of support from the Fortune Society.
- 14 In addition to that, you obtained your high
- 15 school equivalency in 1994.
- 16 A. Yes, at Green Haven Correctional Facility.
- 17 Q. That's good. They can never take education away
- 18 from you, and it is always important to have that.
- 19 A. I also attended Dutchess Community College, for a
- 20 little less than a year.
- 21 Q. Is that something you'd like to continue with, if
- 22 you are to be released?
- 23 A. It's an option, if I'm able to.
- Q. What would you study?
- 25 A. That, I'm not certain of. It was liberal arts,



- 1 English, science.
- Q. Do you have a particular interest?
- A. Not particularly, no.
- Q. There is a lot of opportunities out there. If
- 5 you are on parole, the city has a lot of opportunities,
- 6 more so than you might find in other parts of the State,
- 7 for re-entry programs, assistance for ex-offenders.
- 8 A. Yes.
- 9 COMM. SMITH: Commissioners, any questions?
- 10 COMM. SHARKEY: I have none.
- 11 COMM. COPPOLA: I have no further questions.
- 12 Thank you.
- 13 BY COMMISSIONER SMITH:
- 14 Q. Mr. the last word is yours. Is there
- 15 anything else we should know today, that we have not
- 16 discussed, that you feel is important for us to
- 17 consider?
- 18 A. That I do regret my actions. If I had an
- 19 opportunity to do it over, that I would do everything
- 20 entirely different.
- 21 This is my third meeting over the past
- 22 twenty-three years, and this is like my third time. I
- 23 have outside clearance here. I've had outside clearance
- 24 in my previous facility in Washington, and I've had
- 25 outside clearance in Mid Orange, as well.

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- Q. Mr. we have attempted to give you a
- full, fair and accurate interview. Do you feel that you
- had that today, sir.
- A. Yes, ma'am.
- COMM. SMITH: We will take everything into
- consideration and weigh all the required statutory
- factors, and we will let you know our decision.
- THE INMATE: Thank you very much. Have a
- good day.
- COMM. SMITH: You, too. Have a good day.
- (Interview concluded.)

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1 DECISION

- 2 COMM. SMITH: denied. Hold
- 3 twenty-four months. Next appearance 8/17.
- 4 Parole is denied. After a review of the record and
- 5 interview, the panel has determined that if released at
- 6 this time, there is a reasonable probability that you
- 7 would not live and remain at liberty without
- 8 again violating the law, and your release would be
- 9 incompatible with the welfare of society, and would so
- 10 deprecate the serious nature of the crime as to
- 11 undermine respect for the law.
- 12 This decision is based on the following factors:
- 13 The I.O. of Murder, Second, wherein you caused the death
- 14 of a female by throwing/pushing her from her rooftop.
- 15 This is your second New York State prison term and
- 16 you were on parole at the time of the Instant Offense
- 17 for a Robbery, First, adjudication, and a Robbery,
- 18 Second, conviction.
- 19 You have clearly failed to benefit from prior
- 20 efforts at rehabilitation and failed on Community
- 21 Supervision.
- Note is made by this Board of your Sentencing
- 23 Minutes, COMPAS Risk Assessment, rehabilitative efforts,
- 24 risk, needs, Parole plan, letters of support,
- 25 disciplinary record, and all other required factors.
 (All Commissioners concur.)
