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DIN # NYSID # COMM. STANFORD: Good afternoon. Are you 1 2 3 THE INMATE: Yes, ma'am. 4 COMM. STANFORD: Hi, Mr. I am 5 Commissioner Stanford. I am joined by Commissioners 6 Smith and Hernandez. 7 COMM. HERNANDEZ: Hello. 8 COMM. SMITH: Hello. 9 INTERVIEW BY CHAIRWOMAN STANFORD: 10 Q. Mr. my records reflect that you are 11 serving a sentence of seventeen-years to life for Murder in the Second Degree; is that correct? 12 13 A. Yes, Commissioner. 14 And, so far, you've served over sixteen years; is Q. 15 that right? 16 A. Yes. 17 Q. You took a plea in satisfaction of this charge, 18 in County, and your sentence was in 2000; is that 19 correct? 20 A. Yes, that's correct. 21 You didn't know your victim, did you? Q. 22 No, ma'am. Α. 23 Q. This person was a cabdriver? 24 Yes, it was. Α. 25 I understand, looking at your statement, that you Q.

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1 gave facility staff, in preparation of today, that it
2 was one of your co-defendants, who came up with the idea
3 of robbing a cabdriver; is that correct?

4 A. Yes.

>

5 Q. At your sentencing, did anyone from this man's 6 family come and speak?

7 A. No, ma'am.

8 Q. Do you remember any words that the judge may have 9 placed on the record to you, explaining his or her 10 sentence?

11 A. No, ma'am.

Q. I ask that, because we've tried to get your
 Sentencing Minutes.

14 With every case, the Department of Corrections 15 and Community Supervision makes, at least, two attempts 16 to reach out to the Office of Court Administration, to 17 get a copy of your Sentencing Minutes, so that we can 18 know, the people who are interviewing you can know, what 19 was said at your sentence.

If, for example, the victim's family spoke, or what your defense attorney said, on your behalf, or what the assistant district attorney said, on behalf of the people of the State of New York, or what the judge may have said, before passing the sentence.

25 But we don't have those minutes; even though, we

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1 can see, that a diligent effort was made to get them.
2 Are you also saying you don't have any
3 information from that sentencing, that you can share
4 with us?

5 A. I've been trying to request my Sentencing 6 Minutes, also, to no avail.

Q. Thank you. We do have your sentence and commitment, so we know what the sentence was, and we know who participated in those events, in terms of the judge's name, the district attorney's name, and your defense attorney's name.

12 We have reached out to them, as we always do, also, as a matter of course. In fact, a letter was 13 14 probably sent out many years ago. I think in your case, 15 it was sent in 2001, to those parties, asking them if 16 they had an opinion, that they wanted to share, with a future Parole panel, regarding your release. We never 17 18 got any feedback, positive or negative, from any of 19 those parties. I just want the record to reflect that, 20 as well.

The narrative, the description that the staff provides us, is usually taken from the Probation Report, that's prepared for the judge, at the time of your sentencing.

25 It says that forcibly, certain property was taken

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from this man. He was cut with a box cutter, and then
 he was shot with a handgun.

3 What, specifically, was your participation in 4 this crime?

5 Exactly, what did you do when the property was 6 being taken, when he was being injured, and, finally, 7 when he was being killed? What exactly did you do? 8 A. My participation was, we agreed on a robbery, I

9 was supposed to be a lookout.

In the course of the robbery, the cabdriver
started fighting back. There was a struggle for the
gun. I helped struggle for the gun. When my

13 co-defendant got the gun back, he actually shot him, and 14 then we ran.

15 Q. When you say, "There was a struggle for the gun," 16 where did this struggle take place?

17 A. Inside the cab.

18 Q. Was the cab moving, when the robbery began, or 19 had he stopped?


A. He had stopped. When the robbery began, we werestill.

Q. Now, did you lead him to believe that you three wanted to be taken someplace? Were you at this address you had given him, or were you at the place where he picked you up?



No. We led him to believe that we was going 2 somewhere. 3 Had he arrived to that destination, before the 0. 4 robbery began? 5 Α. Yes. 6 Q. And before anybody got out, that's when 7 everything took place? 8 Yes, ma'am. Α. 9 0. So the three of you were in the cab, in the 10 backseat? 11 Α. Yes. 12 Q. And this was before the days where they had 13 partitions, and all of that; is that correct? 14 A. Correct. 15 0. What do you know about this man, if anything, the 16 cabdriver? 17 A. Absolutely nothing. I just know that he was a 18 father. They told me in court, that he was a father. 19 They didn't say that he was married or anything. There 20 was not too much information that they gave me. I 21 didn't know him. There was not too much information 22 given on him. 23 Q. What do you remember about him? Was he about 24 your age, when the crime was committed? Was he older? 25 Was he younger?

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7 Q. How old is your child?

A. Three-years old.

9 Q. And recently married?

10 A. I'm not married.

Q. So I'm just curious, being nosey, now, more than anything. How is it that you have a three-year old and you're not married? I didn't think that people were allowed visits of that sort, if they weren't married. A. Well, I don't want to put no say on how certain

16 things go on inside facilities, but --

17 Q. Okay. You don't want to incriminate yourself.

18 Is that what you're saying, basically?

A. It's not that I don't want to incriminate myself,but I don't want to bash the facility that I was in.

21 Q. But you believe that you have a biological child,

22 that is three-years old, in any event?

23 A. Yes.

24 Q. Fair enough.

25 What is your plan for where you intend to reside,

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DIN # NYSID # when you are able to go home? 1 2 Well, if I was to be released, I would actually Α. 3 try to parole to my father's house. If that's not 4 available, then I would be trying to get into the 5 Fortune Society. 6 And your father lives in County, presently? Q. 7 Yes, ma'am. Α. 8 0. Does he live in the same address, he was living 9 at, at the time of this crime? 10 Α. No. 11 Now, you mentioned the Fortune Society, as an Q. 12 alternate. Have you had any contact with the Fortune 13 Society? 14 A. I have. I wrote, and they wrote me back. They 15 said they can't hold a bed, unless I have a date. 16 Q. Okay. I see. 17 Now, am I correct, that this was your first 18 conviction of any kind? 19 Α. Yes, ma'am. 20 Q. And you don't have any other misdemeanor or 21 felony convictions, in any other state? 22 Α. No. No federal convictions? 23 0. 24 Α. No, ma'am. 25 We do have your disciplinary history. It 0. Schmieder & Meister, Inc. (845) 452-1988

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suggests that you started having incidents in
 facilities, beginning with Great Meadow, in 2001, maybe
 about seven or so months after you came into state
 custody.

5 You have three Tier III incidents. The first is 6 in '02, also at Great Meadow; then another in '03, at 7 Great Meadow.

8 The first was a violent conduct, fighting. The 9 second was a weapon incident. The third, again, at 10 Great Meadow, was in '04, and that was also a violent 11 conduct, fighting.

12 The last two you received some Special Housing 13 time. The first one looks like the sanction was keep 14 lock.

Since then, between 2005 and 2013, you have approximately eight Tier II incidents. The last one, again, in 2013, at Fishkill; is that right? Does that sound accurate to you?

19 A. Yes.

20 Q. What do you attribute your success in becoming 21 ticket free, since 2013?

A. I know that I've been getting closer to my
family. I attribute it to me growing up and becoming
more mature, you know.

25 When I came in I had the mindset of me not

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1 letting nobody harm me. Then I realized, later on, that 2 I didn't need to. So it came with maturity, I would 3 say.

4 Q. Today, you're thirty-six-years old?

5 A. Yes, ma'am.

Q. You just turned thirty-six, at the beginning of7 the year; is that correct?

8 A. That's correct.

9 Q. We have your risk assessment, which suggests that 10 you present a low risk of felony violence, arrest and 11 absconding.

12 That you are unlikely to have any criminogenic 13 need that specifically tends to lead people back into 14 criminal behavior. Your criminal involvement is low. 15 So, overall, you have a very favorable risk assessment.

We have your Case Plan, which suggests that you have completed your academic program, completed your vocational program, completed your substance abuse program, completed your aggression replacement program, and completed Transitional Services Phase 1, I believe. Does that all sound accurate?

22 A. That's accurate.

Q. Is there anything else that is significant, in your mind, in terms of your program completion or participation, that you want to place on the record?

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1 I took lot of self-help programs. I didn't Α. 2 really come down here with all that paperwork. I didn't 3 feel it was necessary to be coming down and bragging 4 about all the accomplishments that I have in prison. 5 It's unfortunate that I had to get myself in 6 trouble, for me to realize all the good things I could 7 do in life. There's stuff that I accomplished in here, 8 but I didn't come here for that route. 9 0. What would you like to place on this record, that 10 is significant for you to make a record of? 11 Α. For the record, I would like to say, you know, 12 honestly, I'm not the same person that I was when I came 13 in here. 14 You know, in a way, I was kind of a follower. Ι 15 don't want one action to determine my life's worth. You 16 know, I made a lot of bad decisions to shape the person 17 that I thought I wanted to be, and I'm paying for that, 18 regretfully. 19 I don't want this world to see me as that person, 20 to be judged by one action, not mistake, but action I 21 made. You know, there's not too much more for me to 22 say. 23 Do you think the loss of this man's life, earned 0. you the time that you were given? 24 25 Did it earn me the time I was given? Α. Schmieder & Meister, Inc. (845) 452-1988

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1 Q. Yes.

2 A. I really don't understand what that means.

Q. Do you feel that you deserved the sentence that you were given, for the fact that this man was killed, in this manner?

A. I definitely deserved my punishment. I
7 participated in the crime, so I know that I deserved it.

8 It's not like I'm making a gripe about my 9 punishment, that's not what it is. I understand that 10 when you do something wrong you get penalized, and I did 11 something wrong.

I participated in a crime that led to someone's life getting taken. That was never supposed to be the case, but it happened, and I participated, so I understand.

Q. What we are finding, and we see this every week that we are conducting interviews, is when people carry firearms, specifically, people who are not licensed to carry them, people carrying firearms, planning on committing crimes, really, really, awful things can happen, and the worst crime possible, which is murder, can easily happen.

23 Very seldom is it the plan to kill somebody, but,
24 of course, if you're going around with firearms, that
25 are loaded and operable, planning on committing crime,

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1	that's certainly a foreseeable consequence.
2	So having said that, do you see yourself ever
3	participating in a crime involving a firearm, or a crime
4	of this nature, robbery or murder, again, in life?
5	A. Absolutely not. I don't put myself in those type
6	of situations anymore.
7	When I was younger, I didn't know how to keep
8	myself out of certain situations. Now I think, before I
9	put myself in certain situations, so it's easy for me to
10	stay out of trouble.
11	Q. Were you involved in the cutting of this man?
12	A. No. But I was involved with the robbery scene,
13	so
14	Q. I mean, directly, did you cut him?
15	A. No.
16	Q. Did you shoot him?
17	A. No.
18	Q. But you were involved with the struggle for the
19	gun, that was brought by one of you, that ultimately
20	caused him to get shot?
21	A. Yes, ma'am.
22	COMM. STANFORD: I am going to ask my
23	colleagues, if they have any questions?
24	COMM. SMITH: I have nothing else. Thank
25	you.

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COMM. HERNANDEZ: I have no questions.
 CONTINUED BY COMMISSIONER STANFORD:

3 Q. Sir, I think we have covered everything that I 4 wanted to cover. Is there anything you want to say, 5 about the type of work that you foresee yourself being 6 able to do, if you go out in the community soon? 7 Well, I've participated in a lot of self-help Α. 8 programs over the years. My main thing is I like to 9 cook and bake. That's what I'm going for, a program to 10 help me further myself in the career of baking and being 11 a chef. 12 What program are you specifically referring to, 0. 13 now? 14 Α. I'm talking about the Fortune Society, to get me 15 in the door of what I'm trying to do. 16 COMM. STANFORD: Thank you very much, sir, 17 for the time we spent today. We are going to deliberate 18 and consider everything very carefully, render a 19 decision, put it in writing and get it to you as soon as 20 possible. THE INMATE: Thank you. You have a nice 21 22 day. 23 COMM. STANFORD: Thank you. Bye, bye. 24 (Interview concluded.)

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16 DIN # NYSID # 1 (After due deliberation by the Parole Board Panel, the following Decision was rendered:) 2 3 DECISION 4 denied. Hold 15 months. Next appearance, September 2017. 5 6 A review of the record and interview leave the Panel to conclude that your release would be 7 8 incompatible with the welfare of society, and would so 9 deprecate the seriousness of the crime as to undermine 10 respect for the law. 11 The Panel is concerned about the disciplinary 12 history you have created, since you were received into 13 state custody. 14 We urge you to continue to improve your behavior, so that a future Parole Board Panel can have confidence 15 16 in your growth and determination to live a law-abiding 17 life. 18 We have considered your release plans and outreach 19 for community support, your risk assessment, Case Plan, 20 particular actions during the crime, and other 21 information related to factors required by law to be 22 considered. 23 The Panel urges you to maintain good behavior and 24 continue to develop and document positive release plans. 25 (All Commissioners concur.)
