DECISION

COMMISSIONER ARENA: Denied. 24 months.

MS. SOMERS: 1/10.

COMMISSIONER ARENA: After a review of the record and interview, parole is again denied.

You continue to serve 15 to life upon your plea to arson first. This involved you beating a male victim with a lead pipe and then setting fire to the room in which the victim was lying. The victim died as a result of multiple blunt injuries to the head. The room you set on fire was in a residential apartment building with multiple dwellings and housed numerous potential victims. Your heinous acts toward the victim as well as your total disregard for the lives of those who were asleep in their beds at the time you set the fire indicate violent, out-of-control behavior that is of great concern to this panel. During interview you offered extremely limited insight into your behavior.

All factors considered, the panel concludes that your release at this time is incompatible with the public welfare and would so deprecate the seriousness of the offense as to undermine respect for the law.
