How is your English? Q. THE INMATE: Not too well, but I understand. 0. Okay. Well, we provided an interpreter for you. 10 COMMISSIONER LEMONS: Would you first put 11 your name on the record for us please. 1 2 MS. 1 3 1 4 COMMISSIONER LEMONS: And she has interpreted for the board in the past and we 1 5 16 thank you for being here. If it's okay with you, we'll let you listen and Q. 17 answer. If you have any questions or don't understand any of our comments completely, you 19 let the interpreter know. 2 0
- THE INMATE: Okay.
- 22 Q. And we'll do it that way. You sound like you
- speak very well. Okay? Fair enough?
- THE INMATE: Thank you.
- Q. Okay. Okay, Mr. this is a reappearance

- for you. You are presently serving a 15 to life
- sentence for arson first degree?
- THE INMATE: Yes.
- 4 Q. It's an A-1 felony. You pled guilty to that
- s crime, correct?
- FINE THE INMATE: Yes.
- 7 Q. This happened in on ,
- in an apartment. You set fire to a room. Arson
- reports indicate that the fire originated in four
- different locations. The first location -- well,
- I should say one of the originating locations was
- the clothing of a person who was in the room at
- the time. That person had been hit over the head
- with a lead pipe and his clothes were set afire.
- Is there -- would you like to comment on that?
- Would you like to say anything about that?
- THE INMATE: Really I don't know what to
- say because --
- 19 Q. Did you set this fire?
- THE INMATE: Yes.
- Q. Was there a person in the room at the time?
- THE INMATE: Yes.
- Q. And was that person able to leave the apartment
- before the fire started?
- THE INMATE: No, nobody.

- A. (Through the interpreter) No.
- Q. Why did you set the fire? Why did you set the
- apartment on fire?
- THE INMATE: We fight.
- 5 Q. You and the other person?
- THE INMATE: Yes.
- 7 Q. What was the other person's name?
- 8 THE INMATE: I don't know.
- 9 Q. Okay. You and he had a fight. Go ahead.
- THE INMATE: We fight each other. He hit
- me. I hit him. An the then I start fire and I
- 12 left.
- 13 Q. So but you said -- you're telling me what
- happened, but you're not telling me why you set
- the fire. Why did you set the fire?
- THE INMATE: Really --
- 17 A. I really didn't know.
- THE INMATE: I was drunk. But if I fight
- with him and I don't know what went through my
- mind. And I set the fire and I left.
- Q. Now there were other people in the apartment
- 22 building?
- THE INMATE: Yes.
- Q. And you realized that the fire might cause his
- 25 death?

- THE INMATE: On that moment, I don't think
- Q. When you set the fire, did you think he was dead?
- THE INMATE: I don't know if he was dead.
- 5 Q. And was this his apartment?
- 6 THE INMATE: Yes.

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- Q. Okay. Now when you left, when you set the fire
- and you left, where did you go?
- THE INMATE: I just left to the street.
- 10 Q. How soon after that were you arrested?
- 11 A. About three months.
- THE INMATE: About three months.
- 13 Q. Okay, sir. Now you continue to program here.
- Are you in programs here in the prison now?
- THE INMATE: Right now I'm medical
- unassigned.
- 17 Q. There is a final order of deportation on file.
- You are a citizen of ?
- THE INMATE: Yes.
- 20 Q. Do you have family there?
- THE INMATE: Yes.
- 22 Q. Who is there?
- THE INMATE: My mother and my father,
- brother, sister.
- Q. Now I should have mentioned earlier there was

some questions earlier in the prior board about
sentencing minutes. I want you to know that
either all or -- all of the sentencing minutes
that we can obtain are here. We do have -- we
have a notification and affidavit from the courts
indicating no additional sentencing minutes are
on file or can be located, okay? Do you
understand?

- 9 THE INMATE: Yes.
- 10 Q. Is there any comments you would like to make

 about the sentencing minutes? Do you remember

 them? Is there anything you remember the judge

 saying pertaining to parole?
- 14 A. No, I don't remember.
- Now what do you think about everything you did back then now? What do you think about it?
- THE INMATE: I know I did was wrong. I'm

 apologizing to the community, to the victim. I'm

 going to talk to her. I feel better to talk to

 her.
- 21 Q. Okay.
- A. I know that what I did. It wasn't supposed to happen, but I know I was -- I had an alcohol addiction. In my mind, at that time, I was young. Truthfully, when you're young we do

- stupid things. I know that I don't have words to 1 explain this. I know that I committed harm against that person, against that family, against 3 myself, my family. Truthfully, I don't know how to ask for forgiveness. I just know everybody 5 has suffered, the victim, myself. And truthfully I don't have words to ask for forgiveness. I know it should have never happened. I'm repentful. I have learned my lesson. And I hope that one day I could be forgiven. That's all I 10 can do. Thank you. That's all I can say. 11
- 12 Q. Do you have family in ?
- THE INMATE: I have one sister..
- 14 Q. She's in , correct?
- THE INMATE: Yes.
- 16 Q. You know there's a final order of deportation.
- Have you fought that? Are you fighting the
- deportation order?
- THE INMATE: Yes.
- 20 Q. Do you understand what I'm asking you?
- 21 A. No.
- COMMISSIONER LEMONS: Commissioner
- 23 Elovich?
- COMMISSIONER ELOVICH: Nothing from me.
- Thank you sir.

2	about 18 years?
3	THE INMATE: Nineteen.
4 Q.	Nineteen years. We're going to consider
5	everything. We'll try to have an answer for you
6	shortly. Okay, sir?

8	AFTER DUE DELIBERATION BY THE PAROLE BOARD
9	PANEL, THE FOLLOWING DECISION HAS BEEN RENDERED:
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DECISION

Parole is denied. Hold 24 months. Next appearance November 2011.

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Parole release is denied. Following a careful and complete review of the record and of the interview, it is the conclusion of this panel that if you were released at this time there is a reasonable probability that you would not live and remain at liberty without violating the law and your release would be incompatible with the public's safety, and welfare of the community. You continue to serve time for your convictions of arson first degree. You set fire to a bedroom in which a male victim lied on the bed wounded from head wounds. Fire reports indicate the fire originated from four separate locations, including the male victim's clothes. The male victim died at the scene. Your actions displayed calculated acts and a total disregard for the safety of others or property. Due to the seriousness and violence displayed during the instant offense and the total disregard for others, this panel concludes that you remain a threat to the community and release at this time is denied. (THE COMMISSIONERS CONCUR)
