DIN# NYSID# 2 BY COMMISSIONER W. SMITH: Q. Good morning. Would you tell us your name, for the record, please. A. Good morning. I'm Commissioner Smith, I'm Q. Very good. Mr. joined today by Commissioner Sharkey. COMMISSIONER SHARKEY: Hello. INMATE: Yes. Hello. Q. Good morning. You're appearing today at a DeNovo interview, do you understand that? A. Yes. Q. A panel saw you in August of 2016, that panel had imposed a hold and you had appealed the hold and were successful in that appeal, correct? A. Yes. Q. So, what has happened is, you've been scheduled basically for a new interview. That interview is not valid and considered, so it's a new day, a new panel. We have a lot of questions as we look at your release to the community. A. Yes. Q. You continue to serve sentences for murder in the second degree and criminal sale a controlled substance third. You pled guilty. Do you acknowledge committing

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those crimes?

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- 1 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. It looks like the first of those two offenses
- 3 was the sale, that happened in . Were you
- 4 arrested right away for that crime?
- 5 A. I would say about a year later.
- 6 Q. Okay. So, you actually were still out in the
- 7 | community and you didn't get arrested until later, maybe
- 8 at the time of the murder?
- 9 A. Yes.
- 10 Q. You were out in the community?
- 11 A. I think it was like five months. They posted bail on
- 12 me, I bailed and went home.
- 13 Q. So, you did get released on bail?
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 Q. Why would you then get involved in killing the
- 16 | victim?
- 17 A. What happened on that day, it's not like I went out
- 18 | to do something stupid or anything. I had a fiance that
- 19 was living with me, which the record states was my
- 20 girlfriend, but her ex came along on Thanksgiving Day and
- 21 | we got into a dispute. She called me at the house and I
- 22 went over, I tried to talk to him, but it started out as
- 23 a fistfight. After the fistfight, I ended up being
- 24 stabbed, he ended up being stabbed, and he lost his life
- 25 around the whole thing.

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- Q. Right. Now, it looks like it was around the 23rd of November, so that would be Thanksgiving time.
  - A. Right.
  - Q. You have a COMPAS risk and needs assessment that we have had a chance to review. The COMPAS problems were part of the reason that you had a DeNovo hearing, is that
- 8 A. Yes.

right?

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- Q. Did you have a chance to look at your updated COMPAS?
- 10 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Good. In many areas you're a low risk. So,
  for example, risk of violence, arrest, absconding, those
  scores are all one and two, which is what you want, low
  numbers, low risk. Do you understand how that works?
- 15 A. Yes.
- Q. And sometimes the verbiage is a little strange. As
  far as your release plans, your family support is
  actually called low family support, re-entry financial
  and employment expectations, those are all scores of one,
- 20 which is what you want it to be. You have some plans as
- 21 far as being released, I think when I read through your
- record, you have a niece that you can stay with, is that
- 23 right?
- 24 A. Yes.
- 25 | Q. Is that still your proposed address?

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- A. No. What they did, I met with a Commissioner from
- Albany of the Department of Medical for Corrections,

  because I was just recently diagnosed with cancer, stage
- 4 four.
  - Q. I see that.
    - A. So, they suggested I go into a nursing care.
- 7 Q. Is that the Hope, the Hope Center?
- A. Yes, the Hope House, and agreed with them, because I
- 9 need a lot of treatment, to be with them, and I don't
- 10 think my family will be able to be there. They are all
- 11 working and doing different stuff, and I need to take
- 12 care of my health.
- 13 Q. Okay. We have correspondence from the Hope Center.
- 14 We do get medical records and, you know, we have
- 15 information as it relates to your cancer. What have they
- 16 told you as far as your prognosis?
- A. It's stage four, they want to start me on chemo and
- 18 radiation, 35 weeks of radiation and three chemo
- 19 sessions.
- Q. And it's carcinoma, where is it at?
- 21 A. Throat cancer.
- 22 | 0. Throat?
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. All right. So, obviously that's going to require
- 25 some medical treatment and that's something again that we

also consider. Your -- you probably won't likely be employed during that time. You were born in '58, so you are about 58 years old now, right?

A. Yes.

- Q. How would you support yourself, have they talked to you about going on SSI or SSD?
- A. They told me about SSI, but I also told them I have Osborne, Exodus House, a job to work with them.
- Q. Okay. We do have a letter from Osborne dated June of this year, which of course is just before when you would have appeared. They help ex-offenders in a number of ways. The COMPAS also has your scores that start to move up. Your prison misconduct score is five out of ten, kind of right in the middle. Your last discipline was February of 2013, so, again, from your hold in 2014, you have had two good years, but prior to that, you struggled.
- A. The last ten years I've had two misbehavior reports in ten years.
- Q. Okay.
  - A. The one you're talking about, it's a bottle of water that was above 16 ounces. They told me I'm not allowed to have it. I said, why, and when I questioned it, he gave me a ticket, and he said the bottles were no longer allowed.

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- Q. Okay. Overall, it looks like you have probably in excess of 25 misbehavior reports. You did have drug use, that was the ten year ago Tier III. Why do you think you struggled at times with behavior?
- A. Well, I was real stupid, I'm not going to lie to you, Commissioner, I was real dumb, naive, I didn't really think about no consequences through my incarceration until about 15 years ago when I said I have to start changing, I have to start doing this. And I had no education, so I really thought I was a smart ass and I just kept saying, no to this, no to that. And then when I finally got educated, I started thinking, and I tried to utilize the gift God gave me, communicate with people, respect people, and stay focused on the main goal, which was my transformation.
- Q. Okay. You mentioned the education. I think you got your GED early in the sentence, is that right?
- A. No. '94 I got the GED, and then I went thereafter to college and then they terminated the college program.
- Q. Right, but that was during this sentence, is what I meant, while you were here on this sentence you got your GED?
- A. Yes.
- Q. So, that's a positive. You mentioned your health and that's also discussed in your case plan, where your

counselor is working on what will help you progress. They also mention the discipline, they want you to continue positive discipline, and the other area, the area that's probably the highest concern is the history of violence. Not only the instant offense, where we talked about the murder, but you had a youthful offender adjudication which was your first contact with the law, and it looks like that led to probation. That was quite a while ago.

- A. I was 15 years old at that time.
- Q. You had a weapon, it looks like it started off with kidnapping, unlawful imprisonment was the charge, but you were found guilty of the youthful offender of a dangerous weapon and probation, and you were young and we give a benefit to youth in a sense of being understanding that they don't have a full awareness of what their actions are, and they don't necessarily project what's going to happen, but when the Judge gives you probation and youthful offender, they're hoping you behave yourself. Then you had a local jail term it looks like for stolen property. Another local term, criminal trespass, and then your first time in state prison was a manslaughter first that ran along with a, I believe, sodomy in the third, is that correct?
- A. Yes. The sodomy happened at Riker's Island.

Q. You sodomized another inmate, right?

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A. No. I pleaded guilty to it, but the issue is, I don't like making excuses for nothing, they gave us information on the inmate that he was incarcerated for rape and for doing this and that, and like an idiot I acted like I was the Judge on him and started condemning him and everything. And I'll be honest, I had him perform oral sex for what he had did, and I was a hundred percent wrong and I regret everything I did when I was a youth on that day. There's nothing that I can do to go back and correct it, but I'm sorry for what happened that day. The manslaughter charge, that was a relative to a family, he was a drug addict like I was at the time, he was taking money from my mother, pushing her around. I hit him with I think a two by four and like a month later he passed away. I took responsibility for it. I entered a plea of guilty on it and I came up and served my time. I had no education, I was a real dumb kid, I was real stupid, I didn't understand much of the stuff I was doing, and in a sense I thought it was right until I got older and learned everything I did was wrong, and I face it everyday and I live with it everyday. Who I was then, Commissioner, is not the person I am today before you. I transformed everything in me, my way of thinking, my way of communicating with people, how to understand

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situations, how to walk away from violent situations. Since incarcerated, I have no violent conduct whatsoever. I've been working hard. I did it through AVP, facilitating it for like 20 years. I did it through A.R.T., getting the tools that the department gave me to help me. Many officers inside the facility have helped me. When they see me depressed or something, they say, what's going on, and we talk. It's something that I learned, that if I have a problem or an issue, to communicate it, let it out rather than act on it. Q. Okay. I've asked you a lot of questions. We've had a chance to review what was said by the Judges, the was the sentencing Judge for the Honorable murder. The drug charge was, the sentence was the Honorable I don't know if Commissioner Sharkey has any additional questions at this time? COMMISSIONER SHARKEY: I have none.

Thank you.

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- Q. All right. Mr. we thank you for coming in. We will discuss what you said as we look at the record and give you a decision. Did I miss anything, anything else?
- A. Yes. I just want to say, please, don't look at who I was in the past. I'm not who I was, and if you grant me the opportunity to go home, I can promise, just based on

1 my health alone and what I have to do with my health, I 2 will never be involved with the judicial system again. 3 There's nothing for me in prison. I've learned everything that I had to learn. I'm just asking for an 4 5 opportunity to return to society and be with my family 6 and so I can take care of my health. You know, I 7 accomplished much, there are officers who wrote many 8 letters in there, in the parole packet stating who I was 9 throughout the years. I'm just asking to please consider 10 it and don't look at me for who I was. I'm not perfect, 11 I never was perfect, none of us are perfect, we're all 12 working on ourselves, and I made every change that the 13 Department of Corrections has asked of me, the 14 Commissioners have asked of me. I've done everything 15 possible, and I'm willing to continue to do even more of 16 what I'm asked to do and where to go and what not to do, 17 because it's something I believe in, which is change, and 18 I'm just asking look at the changes that I've done, they're before you. I'm not who I was when I committed 19 20 this crime 34 years ago.

Q. All right, sir. Thank you for coming in.

A. Thank you very much.

(After due deliberation by the Parole Board Panel, the following decision has been rendered:)

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### DECISION

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Denied. Hold 24 months. Next appearance August 2018. This panel has concluded that your release to supervision is not compatible with the welfare of society and therefore parole is denied. This finding is made following a personal interview, record review and deliberation. Of significant concern is the escalation of unlawful conduct the instant offenses of criminal sale and murder second represents. We note that your record dates from a 1974 probation sentence for a youthful offender adjudication. Other factors considered include you later received a state sentence for manslaughter. Despite those sanctions, you stabbed a man causing his death during the instant offense of murder. Your COMPAS history of violence score is high. In addition we note your marginal behavior and COMPAS prison misconduct score. Your behavior since February 2013 has improved. We also note your positive programming, case plan, community support, and your medical needs related to stage four cancer. Required statutory factors have been considered, including your risk to the community, rehabilitation efforts, and your needs for successful community reintegration. To grant your release at this

THIS PANEL HAS CONCLUDED THAT YOUR RELEASE TO SUPERVISION IS NOT COMPATIBLE WITH THE WELFARE OF SOCIETY AND THEREFORE PAROLE IS DENIED. THIS FINDING IS MADE FOLLOWING A PERSONAL INTERVIEW, RECORD REVIEW AND DELIBERATION.

OF SIGNIFICANT CONCERN IS THE ESCALATION OF UNLAWFUL CONDUCT, THE INSTANT OFFENSES OF CRIMINAL SALE AND MURDER 2ND REPRESENTS. WE NOTE THAT YOUR RECORD DATES FROM 1974 PROBATION SENTENCE FOR A Y.O.

ADJUDICATION. OTHER FACTORS INCLUDE YOU LATER RECEIVED A STATE
SENTENCE FOR MANSLAUGHTER. DESPITE THESE SANCTIONS YOU STABBED A MAN
CAUSING HIS DEATH DURING THE INSTANT OFFENSE OF MURDER.

IN ADDITION, WE NOTE YOUR MARGINAL BEHAVIOR AND COMPAS PRISON
MISCONDUCT SCORE. YOUR BEHAVIOR SINCE FEBRUARY 2013 HAS IMPROVED.
WE ALSO NOTE YOUR POSITIVE PROGRAMMING, CASE PLAN, COMMUNITY SUPPORT
AND YOUR MEDICAL NEEDS RELATED TO STAGE IV CANCER.

REQUIRED STATUTORY FACTORS HAVE BEEN CONSIDERED, INCLUDING YOUR RISK
TO THE COMMUNITY, REHABILITATION EFFORTS, AND YOUR NEEDS FOR
SUCCESSFUL COMMUNITY REINTEGRATION.

TO GRANT YOUR RELEASE AT THIS TIME WOULD SO DEPRECATE THE SERIOUSNESS OF YOUR OFFENSE AS TO UNDERMINE RESPECT FOR THE LAW.

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
