1 BY COMMISSIONER SMITH:

- Q. Good afternoon. Would you state your name for the record, sir?
- Α.
- Q. Mr. I am Commissioner Smith and joining me today is Commissioner Sharkey.

COMMISSIONER SHARKEY: Hello.

- Q. You are here for what is known as a reappearance.

 You had been seen in June 2011 and held for 24 months,
- 10 is that right?
- 11 A. Yes.

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- 12 Q. Your aggregated term is 18-to-life. So you served just short of 20 years, does that sound right?
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 Q. Are you a violent person?
- 16 A. No.
- 17 Q. A lot of violence in your background.
- 18 A. I understand.
- Q. If you are not a violent person, why do you think you
- 20 have had so many instances of violence in your life?
- 21 You were born in '77, so that makes you about 36 maybe?
- 22 A. Yes.
- 23 | Q. Just turned 36?
- 24 A. Yes.
- Q. Why do you think you have had so many violent

episodes in your life?

A. I had a long time to access my actions and, I have done so for personal reasons. And it took me a long time to come to the conclusion that it was based on my childhood abuse I suffered from my father. I believe the effects of that made me violent toward my peers.

- Q. What had your father done violent to you?
- A. I used to get beat brutally, used to get whipped. I submitted a letter to you what depicted -- took place in my life. As long as I remember, as a child I got beat brutally by my father up until the time of my arrest, to the point at 13 years old I ran away from home, all the way to another state, all the way to Pennsylvania. So at the same time, I understand that my actions wasn't just a sudden event, it had been accumulating things that took place in regards to me attracting myself to all the negative in the community as far as dealing with negative people and I developed bad habits and this was the result.
- Q. In terms of some of those actions, the instant offense represents three periods of violence including the first shooting in --
- A. -- October or September.
- Q. September, that was the one on _____. Was anyone struck with the bullets?

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1 A. Yes.

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- Q. And as a result of that, that was the Attempted Murder 2nd, is that true?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. And that's eventually when you were arrested was after the second shooting, after multiple injuries occurred and I believe one death, is that right?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Did you know the victims of those two shootings?
- A. Yes, regrettably so. We grew up together, actually, we lived in the same community.
 - Q. So why shoot them?
 - A. At that time I didn't have no social skills. I was living in a sense of hopelessness and despair at that time in my life.
- 16 Q. Where did you get the gun?
- A. Unfortunately, I bought it and I know that was a bad decision.
 - Q. Off the street you bought it?
- 20 A. Yes.
- Q. And, of course you didn't have any license to carry that?
- A. Of course not. I was only 16 years old, I was 16

 during the commission of the crime and at that

 particular time I didn't think about the ramifications

of having one, because at that immature age, only thing
that could happen was me having a illegal weapon was
wrong.

- Q. Your violations in prison include Sing Sing violent conduct, assault on inmate, in 1995. You had a weapon offense, Tier-III in Great Meadow in '96; you had a '99 Assault on inmate in Auburn; you had in Attica, 2000, violent conduct, unreported illness. From that you received the most recent conviction: 3-to-6 consecutive for Manslaughter 2nd where you pled guilty to stabbing another inmate at Attica. Is that right?
- 12 A. Yes.

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- Q. I may have misspoke in terms of my math, because with the consecutive, did I say that you had an aggregated 18-to-life? I think I did.
- A. Yeah, you did.
- Q. I wanted to make sure I noted those were consecutive.

 You originally got sentenced --
- 19 A. -- to 15-to-life.
- Q. Right, back in '95. We have the Honorable
- 22 || right?
- 23 A. Yes, that's Attica, yes.
- 24 Q. No, the sentencing minutes --

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I have the record so it might make it easier... , that was your from a attorney back then?

A. Yes.

Q. So it might make it easier for you to remember when I mention the judge. We have what was said back then. Unfortunately, it would have been good if that was the final time that you had seen a judge, but then the Honorable County, sentenced you for the consecutive Manslaughter.

When we look at your Risk and Needs Assessment we try to see your areas of strength, your areas of need are. What have you done to address that violence in prison? Now, I know that you forwarded a number of documents including some real good plans we will get into. What have you done to prepare yourself here that you think is solid and will make you not re-offend? A. Personally, I look within myself and to try and figure out my actions, or what I have done in my past. And because I can't -- even though things I have done in my past, I can't consider myself as evil or someone prone to make mistakes. I believe that I have been gifted with a sense of humanity, and that potential that I have allows me to do good. So, with that knowledge, I told myself I have to turn another leave and with that I

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change my value system because the value system I came to prison with or I grew up with led me to prison. So, I have done a lot of reading in regards to sociology and psychology in regards to understanding human beings. I basically strove to become a better decent human being. But in regards to what I can do in the future as far as plans is, since I have been in prison I had achieved a Department of Labor certificate in Social Living Skills. I was employed in Transitional Services Phase III for a significant amount of time.

- Q. You had also reached out to a number of programs which help ex-offenders.
- A. Right.
- Q. As part of your packet, you have been in contact with Fortune Society, Strive is another program which helps ex-offenders, Osborne Association.

You had indicated your hope is to live with your wife,

- A. Yes.
- Q. Are you legally married to this woman?
- A. Yes.
- Q. We also have a packet that was I want to note we have had a chance to go through that you supplied. This originally went to Judge . We looked at that. Your

- Α.
- Q. And you have your son?
- A. No, my daughter.
- 12 Q. What's your daughter's name?
 - Α. .
 - Q. Okay. We have a letter.
- 15 A. Yes.
- 16 Q. Your mother is that right?
- 17 A. Yes.
- 18 Q. There are other individuals that have also written.
- 19 It's good that you got a letter from your grandmother.
- 20 It's probably heartbreaking for her to have written, do
- 21 you agree?
- 22 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Other family members. So, I mention those in
- particular because often times family is one that will
- 25 motivate you to behave yourself if you are in the

community. That's really what we want. There's a lot in front of us. But we hope that you have prepared yourself to go out into the community.

In terms of the victims, you say you knew them.

The one who died, it says you were in an elevator. The shooting occurred in an elevator?

- A. Yes.
- Q. What was the gun?
- A. It was a rifle.
- 10 Q. Like, a long gun?
- 11 A. Yes.

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- 12 Q. What kind of rifle, a .22?
- 13 A. I don't recall.
- Q. Rifles can shoot a long way depending on the caliber.
- 15 | A. Yes.
- Q. Was it a semiautomatic where you just kept pulling the trigger?
- 18 A. No, I only shot one time.
 - Q. How many people got hit with the bullet?
- 20 A. Two other than -- it's three, three all together.
- 21 Q. Was it a crowded elevator?
 - A. The incident initiated outside the elevator and then he ran into the elevator. And, being impulsive and reckless, I sadly went behind him.
 - Q. You just went behind him -- where did you shoot him?

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- A. And ran away.
- 2 Q. Where did you shoot him? In the back, in the chest?
 - A. I'm sorry, man.
 - Q. I know, but where did you shoot him?
- 5 A. He got shot in the face.
- Q. In the face. My goodness. And you don't know what caliber rifle? I mean, where did you get the rifle?
 - A. I bought it for a couple hundred dollars.
 - Q. What did you do with it once you were done?
- 10 A. I got arrested right afterwards.
 - Q. Did they get the gun?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. The record that I show, it's says basically a rifle, it doesn't give an indication. I am just trying to visualize how multiple people were hurt. Because, the PSI says: Using a rifle shoot _______, causing death. Also injured ______. He also shot at

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Are you sure it wasn't more than one shot?

- A. No, it was one shot, the one bullet penetrated the three of them.
- Q. I don't deny that's a possibility. If someone shots a rifle, it can be powerful, depending on the caliber.

A lot to look at, it's not just the record. We look at your comments as well.

We thank you for providing some information which gives us an update on some of the things you are looking to do.

I don't know if Commissioner Sharkey has any questions?

COMMISSIONER SHARKEY: No questions.

- Q. Anything else, sir, anything else?
- A. I am just getting emotional right now. I understand
- -- I have been in prison since I was 16 years old -- I understand what I have done, I can't take back.
- Q. We understand, sir, I know it's traumatic. I certainly can't know how, but we certainly recognize that this is difficult for you in the sense you have spent a long period of time and so we recognize that.
- Is there anything else, sir?
- A. I'm sorry, I can't talk.
- Q. We will consider what you submitted, which is a lot as well. And I think you did a fine job of gathering up your thoughts in those papers and we will let you know in writing.

Thank you for coming in, sir.

A. All right, thank you.

(Offender was excused.)

(After due deliberation by the Parole Board panel, the following decision has been rendered:)

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DECISION:

Parole is denied. Hold 24 months. Next appearance is 6/2015. This panel has concluded that your release to supervision is not compatible with the welfare of society and therefore parole is denied. This finding is made following a personal interview, record review and deliberation. Of significant concern is your violent conduct on multiple occasions which began with an Attempted Murder 2nd instant offense where shots were Additional factors considered include the fact that within two months of that crime you again fired a weapon, striking multiple victims, causing one death. Multiple violent conduct or assaultive actions while in prison showed a propensity for violence. You then committed a Manslaughter 2nd crime where you stabbed another inmate, causing death. Required statutory factors have been considered, including your risk to the community, rehabilitation efforts, and your needs for successful community supervision. To grant your release at this time would so deprecate the seriousness of your offense as to undermine respect for the law.
