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- 1 COMM. LUDLOW: Good afternoon, sir.
- 2 THE INMATE: Good afternoon, sir.
- COMM. LUDLOW: Sir, you are
- 4
- 5 THE INMATE: Yes, sir.
- 6 COMM. LUDLOW: Mr. I am
- 7 Commissioner Ludlow, with me Commissioner Smith and
- 8 Commissioner Coppola.
- 9 COMM. SMITH: Hello.
- 10 COMM. COPPOLA: Hello, sir.
- 11 THE INMATE: Hello, sir.
- 12 INTERVIEW BY COMMISSIONER LUDLOW:
- 13 Q. Mr. this is your Initial appearance
- 14 before the Board of Parole, sir. You are
- 15 forty-three-years old; is that correct?
- 16 A. Yes, sir.
- 17 Q. You were found guilty by verdict to each of the
- 18 following: Murder, Second, Criminal Possession of a
- 19 Weapon, Second. Controlling sentence, twenty-five to
- 20 life, out of . Is that correct?
- 21 A. Yes, sir.
- 22 Q. You have been in close to twenty-five years; is
- 23 that correct, sir?
- 24 A. Yes, sir.
- 25 Q. That's a long period of time, we certainly

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- 1 recognize that, we are sensitive to that fact.
- Do you have any appeals pending or do you
- 3 anticipate filing any appeals as to the verdicts?
- 4 A. No, sir.
- 5 Q. Nonetheless, I call your attention to the fact
- 6 that we have a certified stenographic reporter in the
- 7 room with us. Every word we discuss is being reduced to
- 8 a verbatim transcript.
- 9 It is possible that the transcript can find it's
- 10 way to other forums, and we caution you about what you
- 11 may say regarding the terms and circumstances of these
- 12 crimes, so as not to impede, limit or jeopardize any
- 13 future opportunity you may have for an appeal.
- 14 You may decline to discuss the terms and
- 15 circumstances of these crimes, if you wish. We will not
- 16 hold that against you. Do you understand all of that?
- 17 A. Yes, sir.
- 18 Q. Are you maintaining your innocence as to either
- 19 of the verdicts?
- 20 A. No, sir.
- 21 Q. Prior to the case going to verdict, did the
- 22 district attorney, in , extend any kind of a
- 23 plea offer to you, if you recall?
- 24 A. There were two plea offers made, that I was never
- 25 aware of, so I went along not knowing that the two plea

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- 1 offers existed.
- Q. Do you recall what the offers were?
- 3 A. One was for twenty-to-life. The other one was
- 4 twelve-and-a-half to twenty-five.
- 5 Q. The twelve and-a-half to twenty-five looks pretty
- 6 good now, doesn't it?
- 7 A. Yes, sir.
- 8 Q. That was never communicated to you?
- 9 A. No, sir.
- 10 Q. That's very unfortunate.
- 11 You have a total of four felonies. This is your
- 12 second-State bid.
- 13 You were on parole at the time, just over a year,
- 14 from a 1990, Attempted Robbery, Second; is that correct?
- 15 A. Yes, sir.
- 16 Q. You were eighteen-years old, at the time, in
- 17 March of 1992, in when you fired a handgun
- 18 into a vehicle. Apparently, there were several
- 19 passengers in the vehicle. The round that you fired
- 20 struck one of the passengers in the head, causing his
- 21 death; is that correct?
- 22 A. Yes, sir.
- 23 Q. At the time you were active in the
- 24 is that correct, sir?
- 25 A. No, sir.

- Q. Were you involved in any gang at the time?
- 2 A. No, sir.
- 3 Q. Are you involved with a gang today?
- 4 A. No, sir. May I explain?
- 5 O. Sure.
- A. If you look at my file, completely, you will
- 7 never find no activity like that. I don't know where
- 8 that information came from. If you look thoroughly in
- 9 my file, you will not find anything like that.
- 10 Q. Did you have a co-defendant in the Instant
- 11 Offense?
- 12 A. No, sir.
- 13 Q. Why would you fire into that car? What was your
- 14 reasoning at the time?
- 15 A. The car passed us real fast, and then they
- 16 started backing up. They made gestures, like they had a
- 17 handgun, so I felt threatened; because I had gotten shot
- 18 in my leg. I fired one time, and it resulted in killing
- 19
- Q. We do not have the Sentencing Minutes on file.
- 21 We do have an affidavit from the principal court
- 22 reporter, July 2016, indicating, and
- 23 I quote from the affidavit: "A diligent search has been
- 24 made at both our off-site facility, and our onsite notes
- 25 storage facility, and neither a copy of the transcript,

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- 1 nor the stenographic notes can be located.
- 2 As a result of the unavailability of the
- 3 transcript and the loss of the notes, I'm unable to
- 4 provide the required transcript," end quote.
- 5 We have the COMPAS Risk Assessment on file. Have
- 6 you seen the COMPAS, sir?
- 7 A. Yes.
- 8 Q. The COMPAS is a risk and needs tool that we draw
- 9 upon in an advisory way, to assist us in complying with
- 10 Executive Law 259 C4, which requires the Board of Parole
- 11 to conduct a risk and needs assessment, as a measure of
- 12 your rehabilitation for re-entry into the community.
- In your case the computer assessment has you at a
- 14 low risk, across the board, for felony violence, arrest
- 15 or absconding.
- If on parole, would you anticipate presenting as
- 17 a low risk to the public safety or something else? What
- 18 are your thoughts?
- 19 A. Well, I definitely am a low risk today. I'm not
- 20 that impulsive individual, that came to prison when I
- 21 was eighteen-years old.
- I understand that I killed and there is
- 23 nothing I can do to bring him back.
- Q. Did you know at the time?
- 25 A. No.

- 1 Q. He was a stranger to you?
- 2 A. Yes.
- 3 O. We have the Case Plan on file. The Case Plan is
- 4 a statement of goals, tasks and activities.
- 5 Among the goals identified: Increase educational
- 6 achievement, you've done that. You have a GED; is that
- 7 correct?
- 8 A. Yes.
- 9 Q. That's to your credit.
- 10 You have been involved with food service as a
- 11 vocational achievement; is that correct, sir?
- 12 A. Yes, sir.
- 13 Q. You completed ART. Practice positive verbal
- 14 behavioral communication, bimonthly patience, listening
- 15 with empathy, value clarification while communicating
- 16 with others or through role play. You've had some
- 17 experience and achievement in that area, as well.
- 18 A. Yes, sir.
- 19 Q. These goals are noted for the record, and they
- 20 are to your credit.
- 21 You can live with a friend in
- ; is that right?
- 23 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And in it terms of work and re-entering the
- 25 community, you've reached out to the Osborne



- 1 Association, and
- 2 What is ?
- 3 A. They offered me a full-time job, if I'm
- 4 considered for parole, in processing and packing meat
- 5 products.
- 6 Q. That's in , is it?
- 7 A. They have locations in , and and
- 8
- 9 Q. And you have been involved with the program WITO,
- 10 which is an acronym For We Innovatively Transform
- 11 Ourself.
- 12 It's probably wise, given the length of time you
- 13 have been inside, to avail yourself of the services of
- 14 these well-known groups.
- Office of Mental Health has you at a Level 7,
- 16 that suggest that you have no contact with mental health
- 17 services; is that correct?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 Q. Now, over twenty-four-plus years, you have
- 20 incurred some disciplinary citations and reports;
- 21 sixteen Tier II's, four Tier III's. You have served
- 22 some Keep-Lock and SHU time over the years; is that
- 23 correct, sir?
- 24 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Program achievements, you have job titles in

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- 1 custodial maintenance, cooking, legal research.
- 2 Apparently, wait-listed for Transitional Services 3.
- 3 You have completed the other programs referenced in the
- 4 Case Plan.
- 5 We do acknowledge an extensive submission from
- 6 you. Did you prepare this, sir?
- 7 A. Yes, with the help of the Parole Preparation
- 8 Project.
- 9 Q. There are letters in here of support; Exodus,
- 10 ,Osborne and others. There's a wealth of information in
- 11 here.
- 12 Anything, in particular, you wish to highlight
- 13 for the Panel's attention?
- 14 A. Everything in the Parole packet is very
- 15 important, because it's my transformation from the
- 16 eighteen, impulsive, individual that I was, when I came
- 17 to prison, to the man that I am today.
- I no longer am that impulsive person, that took
- 19 someone's live. I understand that I took life,
- 20 and there is nothing I can do to bring back.
- 21 There's nothing that I could do.
- 22 Q. We understand.
- 23 We have discussed your Criminal History. Your
- 24 first-State bid was Attempted Robbery, Second, and also
- 25 Robbery, Second; correct? Two felonies on your first

- 1 bid, two felonies on your Instant Offense, on the
- 2 current bid. That's a total of four felonies, overall;
- 3 is that correct?
- 4 A. Yes.
- 5 Q. No out-of-state convictions, sir?
- 6 A. No.
- 7 COMM. LUDLOW: Commissioner Smith?
- 8 COMM. SMITH: I have no other questions.
- 9 Thank you.
- 10 COMM. LUDLOW: Commissioner Coppola?
- 11 COMM. COPPOLA: I have none, thank you.
- 12 CONTINUED BY COMMISSIONER LUDLOW:
- Q. Mr. what else should we know, what's
- 14 important to you, anything additional, before we close
- 15 the interview, sir?
- 16 A. Yes. I would like to say that the person that
- 17 you are reading about is no longer that person today.
- 18 I'm a different individual, who understands that my
- 19 impulsive behaviors and actions resulted in life
- 20 being taken by me.
- 21 I'm responsible for that, and there is nothing I
- 22 can do to bring him back; but I wish I could, because I
- 23 should've never taken something, that should've never
- 24 been taken away, and I'm so sorry. I live with that
- 25 shame every single day of my life.

- I understand that and , I took
- 2 everything away from them, with my poor decision to
- 3 possess an illegal gun and fire into the car.
- 4 Because of my distorted thinking at the time, I
- 5 know that I can never justify what I did, but I try my
- 6 best to make amends.
- Q. We appreciate your expression, sir. We
- 8 understand that it's emotional for you, especially after
- 9 twenty-five years of being on the inside and the loss of
- 10 an innocent life at the time.
- 11 Was there any gunfire emanating from the vehicle,
- 12 towards you, back then?
- 13 A. No, sir.
- Q. Did you see a weapon in the vehicle, before you
- 15 shot?
- 16 A. They just made gestures, and I perceived it of
- 17 them having a weapon. No weapon was ever found inside
- 18 the vehicle.
- 19 COMM. LUDLOW: Mr. you are still
- 20 a young man at forty-three, and we want you to get
- 21 your life turned around in a positive, constructive
- 22 way. We wish you good luck in that regard.
- Mr. we will advise you in
- 24 writing. Good luck to you, sir.
- THE INMATE: Thank you, sir. (Interview concluded.)

- 3 the following Decision was rendered:)

- 7 parole denied. Hold 24 months.
- 8 Next appearance, November 2018.
- 9 Following careful review and deliberation of your
- 10 record and interview, this Panel concludes that
- 11 discretionary release is not presently warranted, due to
- 12 concern for the public safety and welfare.
- The following factors were properly weighed and
- 14 considered: Your Instant Offenses, in , in
- 15 1992, involved Murder Second and Criminal
- 16 Possession of a Weapon Second.
- 17 Your Criminal History indicates you were on parole,
- 18 at the time, from a 1990 Attempted Robbery, Second.
- 19 Your institutional programming indicates progress
- 20 and achievement, which is noted.
- 21 Your disciplinary record reflects multiple Tier II
- 22 and Tier III reports. You have served Keep-Lock time.
- 23 The Panel notes your COMPAS risk score of low;
- 24 however, your disciplinary history is of particular
- 25 concern to this Panel

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Required statutory factors have been considered;
. 1
     including your risk to the community, rehabilitation

     efforts, and your needs for successful community

     re-entry.
          Your discretionary release, at this time, would
 6
    thus not be compatible with the welfare of society at
 7
    large, and would tend to deprecate the seriousness of
 8
    the Instant Offenses and undermine respect for the law
