1 BY COMMISSIONER J. SMITH:

Q. Good evening, sir. Would you state your name for the record.

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Q. Mr. I'm Commissioner Smith. This is

Commissioner Ferguson and Commissioner Alexander.

COMMISSIONER FERGUSON: Hello, sir.

COMMISSIONER ALEXANDER: Hello.

THE INMATE: Good afternoon.

Q. This is your initial parole board appearance today.

The record indicates you're presently incarcerated following convictions after trial for Murder 2nd and Criminal Possession of a Weapon 2nd. The controlling sentence being the murder, 21 to life, both out of Westchester County, correct?

- A. Yes, it is, Commissioner.
- Q. Do you have any appeals pending on your case?
- 18 A. No, Commissioner.
 - Q. I will advise you as a matter of record we have transcription being taken here which would be available for any further proceedings.

Prior to your case going to trial, was a plea offer extended to you by the district attorney in Westchester County?

A. Yes, it was.

- Q. Do you recall what it was?
 A. It was 15 to life.
 Q. Any reason you didn't take it, sir?
 - A. Yes. Because I was scared. I was scared to come to jail and I wanted to try to do everything I can to downplay what I did and I know that I took
 life and she was an innocent person and because I couldn't control my anger and I couldn't control not getting my way, she lost her life.
- 10 Q. We're going to discuss those things.

We do have your sentencing minutes on file and I've read through those. I saw the statements that the family made. I believe you were sentenced on her 16th birthday?

- A. Yes, I was.
 - Q. This offense dates back to of 1994. It looks like you were about 17 at the time?
- 18 A. Yes, I was, Commissioner.
 - Q. You were in a relationship with She was about 15 at the time. I guess there was an argument at some point in time. You went to your bedroom, got a sawed-off shotgun from your dresser or the bottom of your drawer, came back in, pointed it at her and shot her in the face and torso.
 - A. Yes, Commissioner,

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Q. The shotgun blast splattered blood and teeth all over 1 2 the living room. You tried to clean it up. The shotgun fragments were all over the place and you dragged her 3 body downstairs through the basement door, out into the 4 garden and dug a shallow grave and buried her in it? 5 6 A. Yes, Commissioner. 7 Q. Very violent, very tragic. It appears to be your first crime. 8 9 A. Yes, it was. Q. So how long had you and been in a 10 relationship? 11 A. It was a couple of months, beginning of the school 12 13 year. Q. So what happened on that day that got so out of hand? 14 A. -- on 1994, when I took 15 life, I called her over so we could talk 16 about our relationship because she wanted to change 17 18 something in me and I wasn't --19 Q. What did she want to change in you? 20 A. She wanted me to be less on the street and so forth and I didn't want that. The only way I knew how to 21 express myself was with violence. If I couldn't get my 22 way, I would resort to violence. So I went and got the 23 gun and I showed her and I said "This is what I'm about. 24

I'm not ready for change yet." And when I showed her

the gun, she's like "What are you going to do with that?" I said "This is my life right now" and I pulled the trigger.

- Q. Now, you say this was your life right now but you had no prior involvement or at least you were flying under the radar.
- A. Yes, I was.

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- Q. What were you involved in? What was your life?
- 9 A. I was in the street and because I was in the street,
- I was scared so I had to carry a gun because I know other guys in the street were carrying guns too.
- 12 Q. What were you doing? Drugging it? Selling?
- 13 A. No, I wasn't selling drugs.
- 14 Q. Gang?
- A. I wasn't in a gang. I was a robber. I was robbing people.
- 17 Q. Robbing people?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 Q. Were you hurting people?
- 20 A. No -- yes, I was because I was taking their
- 21 hard-earned property.
- 22 Q. But as far as were you inflicting any physical
- 23 injuries in these robberies, pistol whipping them, doing
- 24 anything like that?
- 25 A. Yes. If it came down to it, yes, I was.

- 1 Q. But you weren't arrested or charged for any of those?
- 2 A. No, I was not.
- 3 Q. What gang were you a member of?
- 4 A. It was just a bunch of us who were in the community.
- 5 Q. Not an organized gang?
- 6 A. No, it wasn't.
- 7 Q. So, obviously, she saw some good in you. She could
- 8 have just dumped you and moved on but she thought you're
- 9 worth hanging on to but you need to change.
- 10 A. She saw that. That's the kind of person she was.
- 11 And she'd always tried to get me to don't do that, come
- 12 stay over here and I wasn't -- it was the farthest thing
- 13 | from my mind, I just wanted to do what I wanted to do.
- Q. Here you have a gun. You loaded it at some point in
- 15 | time, right?
- 16 A. Yes, before, but at that instance, I had an
- 17 altercation in school and I had brought the gun to
- 18 school.
- 19 Q. You took a sawed-off shotgun to school?
- 20 A. Yes. Because I was just carrying a gun.
- 21 Q. That's not something you can tuck in your pants
- 22 pocket.
- 23 A. Yes, because I'm a big guy.
- 24 Q. You're tall, but still.
- 25 A. It was from my knee to my top of my waist, that's how

long the gun was. So I would carry it.

- Q. Stick it down your pants and let it hang parallel with your leg?
- A. Yes.

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- Q. That's a little screwed up, if you don't mind me saying.
- A. It definitely was. That mentality was -- that mindset was heinous. There was no place for it in society.
- 10 Q. Were you two arguing?
- 11 A. Yes, we was, because she was really trying to get me
- 12 to change my life for her and she seen I was getting --
- 13 I was about to graduate high school. She was like you
- 14 have to change.
- Q. Now, I believe someone in your family came home and saw the scene.
- 17 A. Yes. My mother and my sister.
- 18 Q. What did you say to them?
- A. I told them that I shot somebody. I told them that I shot somebody and I buried the body.
 - Q. Then what happened?
- 22 A. Well, my mother brought me upstairs because we live
- 23 I in a two-family house. My sister lived downstairs and
- 24 my sister called the police.
- 25 Q. So you were apprehended right away?

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A. Yes.

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- 2 Q. You have an ICE detainer also, right?
 - A. Yes, I do.
 - Q. For
- 5 A. Yes.
 - Q. How long have you been in the country?
- 7 A. 32 years. I came to America when I was 5 years old.
- 8 Q. So all your family is here, right?
 - A. Yes, they are.
- 10 Q. If you were released and deported, who do you have in
 11 Jamaica?
- A. Well, my father is going to retire and go back to

 with me and my mother, she said she would maybe

 like in 6 months, she'll come and check on me and I have

 extended family there, cousins and aunts.
 - Q. It sounds like it was a violent death. A shotgun blast caused grave injuries.
 - A. It was horrific and I'm sorry that you all have to go through that again and every day I do think about it because she should have never lost her life and her family trusted me with her kid and I let them down because I took their daughter's life and I never gave them a chance to give them closure with ______ They never told her they loved her that day or whatever.
 - Q. I'm sure she died instantly.

A. And I didn't -- I was so selfish that I didn't know that she died but I never called the police and asked for assistance. I was just thinking about myself and not coming to jail.

- Q. Didn't somebody, a minor-aged relative see you carrying, dragging the body?
- A. No. My niece -- my niece was downstairs with my nephew and when the gunshot went off, I went down there and I made sure that they stayed in the house. I didn't want them to see that.
- Q. Your COMPAS shows you to have a low risk of violence, arrest, and absconding. No reported issues with substances.

We do have a number of letters of support on your behalf. Despite the gravity of the situation and the tragic loss of life, we have a number of letters of support and people who are standing by you and want to assist you.

I believe you have a daughter?

A. Yes, I do.

- Q. How old is she?
- 22 A. She's 20 years old now.
 - Q. Good forbid if that was her, what if she gets into a relationship with a guy who was either on the streets or just no good and gets in a domestic and he kills her?

A. If that would ever happen to my daughter, the person 1 2 should get the time that the courts give. If that 3 person realized their mistakes and see that they could 4 change and try to better themselves for society, I think they should deem a second chance to prove to society 5 6 that they have changed and they want to better 7 themselves in society. Q. So, again, if that was you, God forbid if that was 8 9 you as the victim's father, you could forgive? 10 A. Yes, I can. Q. That's good. That's good to hear. 11 12 You've done your parole packet? You did this yourself? 13 A. Yes, I did. 14 Q. You did a nice job on it. Thank you for doing that. 15 A. Thank you, Commissioner. 16 Q. We also note you started with a letter of apology to 17 the victim and her family as well as your personal 18

Q. We also note you started with a letter of apology to the victim and her family as well as your personal statement and your accomplishments along with your parole and release plans.

Now, if you are not deported, where are you going to live?

23 A. In

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- Q. That's with your mother?
 - A. My mother and father.

Q. What can you do for work on the outside?

A. Well, my trade in here was an electrician and I'm

found of electricity since I was a child in father is a licensed electrician in

- Q. You should certainly get some work in that.
- A. Yes. I would try to get my license, first and foremost, by being an apprentice. When I do get that, that's what I'm going to do.
- Q. We have a number of letters of support in the file for you, as I mentioned previously. Also, some family pictures. You have a lovely family.
- A. Thank you.

- Q. I have your list of programs and certificates.

 What's been the most significant program you've taken since you've been in DOCCS?
 - A. My ART started me because it made me realize that I had a very violent personality and it made me work on my violent personality and then I knew I had to take other programs also and I took a program, Overcoming Criminal Thinking, and it got me deeply looking inside myself. It made me see how I could think the way I thought and how I could act the way I acted and I built from that.

 Q. As far as your discipline is concerned, you've had some Tier IIs over the years as well as three Tier IIIs. The last, however, was in 2007, a Tier III. I'm not

1 sure exactly what that means. 2 COMMISSIONER FERGUSON: Unauthorized organizational. 3 Q. Then you had a Tier II at Coxsackie in 2010? A. Yes, I did. 4 5 COMMISSIONER J. SMITH: Commissioners, any questions? 6 COMMISSIONER FERGUSON: Nothing additional. Thank 7 you. BY COMMISSIONER ALEXANDER: 8 9 Q. What happened in '07, that violent conduct ticket? You lost 36 months of good time and 6 months of SHU, 6 10 months of phone. It sounds pretty serious. 11 A. I was still thinking that I had to prove myself 12 13 because I didn't -- nobody else's feelings then were still not on my thought. I thought I had to do what I 14 had to do because I had to show people that I'm big and 15 I'm violent to keep people off of me. So I gave 16 17 somebody a knife and I told that person "You got to, you know, defend yourself." I didn't tell that person you 18 19 talk it out or stuff like that, like I do now. I told that person "Here's a knife. Go handle your business." 20 21 Q. Thank you. BY COMMISSIONER J. SMITH: 22 23 Q. That's 12-plus years after you killed this young girl you're still thinking that way. 24

A. I still had that mentality because I was scared to

make people see that I'm not violent. I had a persona that I was violent all this time so I kept that up even when I came into the penitentiary because I feel that being soft was weak. I didn't know that -- I didn't know that it wasn't at that time. I didn't know that you could be who you really are. Q. Okay, Mr. The last word is yours. Anything

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else we should know today that we've not discussed that you feel is important for us to consider?

A. Yes. It's that, again, that I'm sorry that I didn't family closure and I'm sorry that they trusted me with their daughter because I knew the family and I took that trust away from them and I know was a wonderful person and she would have been a wonderful person in society because she was -- she saw something in me and she tried to always install that, always keep coming and telling me do better, do this, do that, but I didn't want to do that and I'm sorry that I didn't take heed at that time. I'm sorry that it took me so many years to realize that I could be who she wanted me to be and I could be productive for society in here or out on the street and I owe that to her and I owe that to her family. Every day, regardless if I'm here or in the street, I will try to uplift that and I will try to be that.

1	Q. All right, sir. A lot of information for us to	
2	consider. We will let you know our decision. We wis	h
3	you well.	
4	A. Thank you.	
5	Q. Have a good evening.	
6	COMMISSIONER FERGUSON: Have a good night.	
7	(After due deliberation by the Parole Board Panel	,
8	the following decision has been rendered:)	
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DECISION

Denied 24 months. Next appearance is 7/17.

Parole is denied.

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After a review of the record and interview, the panel has determined that your release would be incompatible with the welfare of society and would so deprecate the serious nature of the crime as to undermine respect for the law.

This decision is based on the following factors of Murder 2nd and Criminal Possession of a Weapon 2nd wherein you did shoot your 15-year-old girlfriend to death with a sawed-off shotgun during a domestic dispute. Thereafter, you dragged her body outside and buried her in a shallow grave.

Note is made by this board of your sentencing minutes, COMPAS Risk Assessment, rehabilitative efforts, risk, needs, parole plan, letters of support, disciplinary record, and all other required factors.
