DIN 1 INTERVIEW BY COMMISSIONER ELOVICH: 2 Hi, please state your name for the record? 3 I'm Commissioner Elovich. 4 Hi, Mr. 5 With me today is Commissioner Ferguson and 6 Hallerdin. How are you today, sir? 7 COMMISSIONER FERGUSON: Hello. 8 I'm all right. 9 I know you've met me a few times before. 10 Yes, ma'am. 11 But I want to let you know that we have a 12 different configuration of the panel today that 13 we have had in the past and I believe you've never met Commissioner Hallerdin. So we are not 14 15 bound in any way by past decisions, okay? A 16 Yes, ma'am. 17 Now, you are serving 15 to life for murder in the second degree, correct? 18 19 A Yes. 20 And the instant offense involved you stabbing 21 a female victim numerous times with a hunting 22 knife causing her death. You had a romantic 23 involvement with the female victim at one point 24 and you were not happy with her lack of attention

to you the night of the murder and as such you

DIN NYSID 1 ended up killing her, is that correct? 2 Well, I was out drinking that night and she 3 was playing head games, we had broke up and I'm wrong for what I did, I killed her. I committed . 4 5 a terrible act and I am deeply sorry for that. 6 And I want to let you know I read your 7 personal statement, your current personal statement in the parole packet that you submitted 8 9 to us for today's interview and we are going to 10 go over all of this in a moment, okay? 11 Yes, ma'am. 12 Now, I see you did have a prior misdemeanor 13 assault which you got probation for and you were 14 on probation at the time of the instant offense. 15 That misdemeanor assault also involved a female 16 victim, correct? Was it your fiance or 17 girlfriend? 18 Fiance. 19 And you had been convicted of the misdemeanor 20 assault for putting your hands around her neck 21 basically choking her, she didn't die as a result 22 of your actions, but you did have your hands 23 around her neck which is what you stated --24 A Yes, ma'am.

	2		statement. Do you think you had some major
	3		issues with impulse control concerning women?
	4	Α	Yes, ma'am, I was very, I was controlling.
93	5		As a young man I was controlling and possessive
	6		and I had impulse control. Over the years of my
	7		incarceration I've learned to control my anger
	8		and to think rationally when I make decisions.
	9	Q	What do you think the rage towards women
	10		stemmed from?
	11	Α	I grew up in an abusive alcoholic household
	12		and I feel it was instilled in me growing up, a
	13		learned behavior and I feel over the years I've
	14		changed that. I want to break the cycle of what
	15		I grew up with. I always thought it was wrong
	16		what my dad did to my mom but I ended up doing i
	17		myself. It was like a pattern that I learned.
	18	Q	And it escalated in nature?
	19	A	Yes, it did.
	20	Q	Tell me what efforts you've made towards
	21		rehabilitation since your last Board interview?
	22		And I do see the letter that you wrote to the
	23		Board where you did make some current revelation
	24		about yourself and you also talked about some of
×	25		your medical issues with some hearing loss?

1	A	Yes, ma'am.
2	Q	And you talked about some of your
3		accomplishments which include masonry and food
4		service?
5	Α	I'm currently in food service now for six and
6		a half months and to show that I don't have
7		problems financially I've saved up \$100 in the
8		last five months. And I'm going to
9		halfway house. In his program if you
10		release me, he offers job training skills and
11		culinary arts and computer training and helps you
12		find a job and also going to outpatient
13		treatment. In domestic violence I would like to
14		utilize my situation to help others that weren't
15		able to see the problems they were going through
16		as I did when I was 22 years old in 1983.
17	Q	What's the name of the program that you'd
18		like to go into? You listed the program,
19		
20	A	has different programs up
21		in they have a halfway house.
22	Q	Yes. And we are familiar with their
23		programs. Okay, and I see that you do have some
24		past letters of support from family
25	A	Yes.

NYSID 1 -- as well? 2 A Yes. 3 And friends. 4 A Yes, I'd like to bring up one thing, in the 5 risk assessment it has me for a low family 6 support. Six of my family members have passed 7 away and DOCCS has kept me far from home, it's 8 been difficult for my family to travel. There is 9 a letter from my niece on Monday informing me that my sister has stomach cancer and I have 10 a disabled brother who's been disabled from a car 11 12 accident, he's blind, brain damaged and he is in a nursing home wearing diapers and confined to 13 14 bed and a wheelchair for 30 years, they can't 15 come and visit me. 16 I am sorry for that. In terms of low family 17 support we will cross out the probable, based on 18 what you said and based on what I saw in the file 19 you did have some past family support. So that 20 is understood. In terms of your overall risk in 21 the COMPAS they score you as a low for future 22 felony violence and re-arrest, that's basically 23 based on your age and the amount of time that 24 you've served. In terms of your criminogenic 25

needs the need that they have as the highest goes

from your prison misconduct which is ability to
follow the rules, and that's based on your past

1	Q	It was always a tier II. After the hearing
2		did they change it?
3	A	They found me guilty, he just gave me 12 days
4		and they cut me loose.
5	Q	That's understood. And I also see your
6		audiology report that you submitted to the Board
7		with your papers today. So we'll take that into
8		consideration. It says that the hearing loss is
9		non-significant, the measured hearing loss of
10		less than 40 DBs in this patient's unaided better
11		ear. So you're not wearing a hearing aid or
12		anything, right?
13	Α	I have two hearing aids.
14	Q	You do have two hearing aids, okay, all
15		right.
16	A	One is being fixed, now they are going to
17		call me back out sometime this month to get it.
18	Q	All right, well according to this audiology
19		report it doesn't say that it's very severe.
20	A	It's background noise.
21	Q	Background noise, okay, got it. Well, we
22		will take that into consideration when making our
23		decision as well. I also see you submitted your
24		high school equivalency diploma as well as your
25		Community College transcript. So

2			you've been here as well as your vocational
3			programming and we have all of your certificates
4			for that. You've done well with the food
5			service, masonry, brick layer as well as some
6			other vocations. And we have your certificates
7			in here for all of those as well. You've also

9	100		abuse and you've taken ART. So what would you
0			say was your most significant accomplishment
11			while you've been in here?
12	X.	A	I've learned to control my temper. I don't
13			act out violently. In 31 years I've never hurt
L 4			anyone and I act rational. I make rational
15			decisions before I make decisions, before I do
16			things. I am also, I would like to bring to your
17			attention as far as relationships it took me a
18			while to realize this but I'm gay. I'm

2 I've taken time over the years and 3 acknowledged and accepted who I am. And if I am 4 . released, I'm 53 years old I would like to get a 5 job and work, get a good rapport with my parole 6 officer and work toward retirement. I'm not a 7 young man anymore.

8 Okay. Thank you, sir and we appreciate you 9 taking the time to share that with us and also 10 being comfortable enough to share that with us 11 and also the thoughts that you put in your . 12 personal statement. What do you think your 13 actions of murdering this young woman have done 14 to the family of the woman? How do you think 15 that affected them and may still continue to 16 affect them because that is something that we 17 have to consider legally when making our 18 decision?

19 Terrible impact on their lives. I took 20 life. I caused them tremendous pain and 21 suffering over the years and also my own family 22 for killing my girlfriend Because of my 23 actions she never got a chance to get married or have children or grow old. It's a tremendous 24 25 impact on what I've done. It's a terrible thing.

NYSID 1 DECISION 2 BY COMMISSIONER ELOVICH: 3 Parole is denied, hold 24 months, next 4 appearance August 2014. 5 After a review of the record and interview, the 6 panel has determined that if released at this time, your release would not be compatible with the welfare of society. The Board has considered all 8 9 required statutory factors including your risk to 10 society, criminogenic needs for successful re-entry, 11 release plans, and institutional adjustment. More 12 compelling, however, is the callous disregard you 13 have for the life of the young female victim whom 14 you stabbed multiple times with a hunting knife 15 causing her death. This brutal crime was a 16 continuation and severe escalation of a prior 17 assault third degree conviction which involved you 18 choking a female victim with whom you were also in a 19 relationship. You were on probation for that crime 20 when you committed the murder. Your pattern of 21 extreme violence against women is of concern to the 22 panel. Since your last Board appearance you 23 incurred a tier II infraction for harassment and 24 creating a disturbance. The Board notes your 25 personal statement, letter from the
