2 NYSID # COMM. ALEXANDER: Good afternoon. 1 2 THE INMATE: Good afternoon. COMM. ALEXANDER: Are you 3 THE INMATE: Yes, ma'am. 4 5 COMM. ALEXANDER: Hello. My name is Commissioner Alexander. I am joined today 6 7 by Commissioner Hernandez and Commissioner Parole Chair 8 Evans. 9 COMM. EVANS: Hello. 10 THE INMATE: How are you doing? 11 BY COMMISSIONER ALEXANDER: 12 This is a reappearance for you, correct, Q. 13 sir? 14 A. Yes, ma'am. 15 And you have been before the Board a number 16 of times, correct? 17 A. Yes, ma'am. 18 I have not seen you. I'm not sure if the 0. 19 other Commissioners have seen you. I don't think they 20 have, but it's important for us to consider your

- 23 appearance, and what your plans would be, if you were
- 24 released. Okay?

- Q. So I see you are here for Manslaughter,
- 2 First. You were committing a robbery with other
- 3 co-defendants.
- 4 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 5 Q. Why did you stab the victim?
- A. Well, we got into a heated argument and the
- 7 individual would not cooperate, and during that time,
- 8 we just started fighting with him, and he was stabbed
- 9 by me.
- 10 Q. And is it true he was stabbed by you seven
- 11 times?
- 12 A. No, it was not all by me.
- Q. Who did the stabbing?
- 14 A. Me and my other two co-defendants, that were
- 15 never apprehended.
- 16 Q. Basically, you were held holding the bag; is
- 17 that what you are saying?
- 18 A. Yes, ma'am. I was part of that.
- 19 Q. How did you get caught and your other two
- 20 co-defendants remained free?
- 21 A. Well, I was there, I went straight to my
- 22 house. I lived in the same area. I went straight to
- 23 my house. The next thing I knew, they were knocking
- 24 at my door.
- Q. And you pled to this; is that correct?

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- 1 A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. So are you accepting responsibility for this
- 3 crime?
- 4 A. I accept full responsibility for my actions
- 5 and committing this crime.
- 6 Q. Why did you do that?
- 7 A. Because, you know, I wanted to make amends.
- 8 I just felt it was the right thing to do, come clear
- 9 with myself, and clear with the people that I did this
- 10 to their family, Mr. family, you know. I
- 11 didn't want this to be on my heart all the time, you
- 12 know.
- Q. So why did you stab Mr.
- 14 A. Well, we went there to look for money. I
- 15 had a drug habit at the time, and I needed money for
- 16 my drug habit.
- 17 These individuals that I was with, they were
- in the same position I was in, and we went there for
- 19 money.
- 20 Q. Now, this is not your first time in state
- 21 prison, correct?
- 22 A. Right.
- Q. How many times have you been in state
- 24 prison, sir?
- 25 A. Two other times.

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- 1 Q. Two other times. And one time was for
- 2 Robbery Second.
- A. Burglary.
- Q. Okay. Then the second time was a Rape
- 5 charge?
- 6 A. Yes. With that I was -- the case was
- 7 dismissed. I went back to court on a reversal and it
- 8 was dismissed.
- 9 Q. Well, there's one -- I see one in 1975.
- 10 A. A no true bill.
- 11 Q. And that was a no true bill. What about in
- 12 1979?
- 13 A. That's what I was talking about. I went
- 14 back to court on a reversal, and it was dismissed.
- 15 Q. So your second time in state prison was for
- 16 burglary?
- 17 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 18 Q. Why all the crime? I mean, it dates back to
- 19 the 1970s. Very violent.
- 20 A. Well, at the time, I wasn't educated, you
- 21 know. My mother and my father used to fight all the
- 22 time. I used to watch them fight.
- 23 My mother went through a lot with this man
- 24 here, and when he left, you know what I'm saying, he
- 25 left us there with my mother. She had to raise

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- 1 thirteen kids.
- 2 At the time, my brother, my old brothers and
- 3 my sisters, they went to foster care, and they left me
- 4 in the house as the oldest.
- My mother had to go out to go to work. I
- 6 snuck out of the house, you know what I'm saying. I
- 7 would do things to bring food home to my sisters and
- 8 brothers, because a lot of nights, we went to bed
- 9 hungry, you know.
- My mother would tell me, "Keep the door
- 11 locked, don't open the door for nobody," because she
- 12 didn't want BTW to sneak up there and find all of us
- 13 up there. And she would be out of the house and would
- 14 not be back until like 10:00 or 11:00 at night.
- 15 Q. I mean, I know that you had a difficult
- 16 upbringing, but there are plenty of people with
- 17 difficult upbringings who don't end up in prison,
- 18 committing Manslaughter, right?
- 19 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 20 Q. So let's talk about how you have done in
- 21 prison, especially the last two years. I see you only
- 22 have one disciplinary ticket.
- 23 What have you done for programming over the
- 24 last two years?
- 25 A. I have been to the Breaking Barriers class.
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- I have been to reconciliation, which I am in now.
- 2 Writing course. I work in food service. I do a lot
- 3 of other classes, NA, AA.
- Q. So with all this programming, as you look
- 5 back on your Criminal History, what would you do
- 6 differently now?
- 7 A. Well, I'm a lot older. I'm matured now.
- 8 I'm educated. I have educated myself since I have
- 9 been in prison. I know how to treat human beings. I
- 10 respect the law. I respect people. I am a lot more
- 11 humble than I was before. I am not angry anymore.
- 12 I'm not violent.
- 13 I'm a Christian, born-again Christian. I
- 14 take my church life real serious. I just, you know,
- 15 stay away from trouble, and try to pick and choose the
- 16 company that I be around.
- 17 Like I said, I am a lot older now and it's
- 18 time for me to start acting like the mature adult, you
- 19 know what I'm saying, that I was supposed to have
- 20 been.
- Q. I see that you would like to live at Ready,
- 22 Willing and Able, and also have them help you with
- 23 your employment, correct?
- 24 A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. That would be in sir?

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- 1 A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. Do you have any family support out there?
- 3 A. Yes, ma'am. I have a wife. I have my
- 4 children. I have my sisters. I have my Aunt
- 5 my grandmother, The church.
- Q. What do you need in term of programming, on
- 7 the outside, do you think?
- 8 A. I think I can still use a little vocational
- 9 training. Substance abuse. Like I could still
- 10 continue my substance-abuse recovery. I know it's a
- 11 lifetime process. Basically, that's about it.
- 12 Employment, probably.
- 13 Q. I've looked at your Compass Risk Assessment.
- 14 Do you remember that multiple choice questionnaire?
- 15 A. Yes, ma'am.
- 16 Q. Which was formed based on your answers, your
- 17 age, your history. It says that they don't think you
- 18 need much in terms of substance abuse, but there's
- 19 nothing wrong with continuing the programming.
- It does talk about your history of violence
- 21 being very high. What do you think about that?
- 22 A. Well, since then, since I came into prison,
- 23 I have dealt with my violence, my anger, my violence,
- 24 you know, through numerous programs that I am taking,
- 25 and that I am still taking right now.
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- If released, I will continue to program
- 2 towards my violence and my anger.
- 3 COMM. ALEXANDER: I've also looked at your
- 4 sentencing minutes.
- 5 Commissioners, do you have any questions?
- 6 COMM. HERNANDEZ: I have none.
- 7 COMM. EVANS: Nor do I.
- 8 BY COMMISSIONER ALEXANDER:
- 9 Q. You get the last word today, Mr.
- 10 Is there anything that you would like to say
- 11 in terms of parole, that we have not covered yet this
- 12 afternoon?
- 13 A. I just want the Commissioners to know that I
- 14 am not the same person that I was when I first came in
- 15 here. You know, I came a long way from the time I
- 16 came into the system. I had choices that I could have
- 17 made, other than bettering myself when I first came
- 18 in, but I chose not to.
- 19 When I was sitting in that precinct I said
- 20 to myself, I'd like to make a change in my life now,
- 21 you know, I have to start making a change in my life now.
- 22 Since I've been in here, I got my GED. I've
- 23 been to college, I got credits. I've been to numerous
- 24 programs, and I am still programming. I help people.
- I changed my ways, my thinking. My thinking

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- 1 is much better, because I know my thinking controls my
- 2 behavior.
- When I changed my behavior I know that I am
- 4 a better person now. People come up to me and tell me
- 5 that I am not the same person that I was when they
- 6 first met me, when I came into the system, you know.
- 7 I just think I am a better person today.
- 8 I am not -- excuse me for stuttering. I
- 9 don't have that criminal mentality anymore.
- 10 COMM. ALEXANDER: I want you to also know I have
- 11 reviewed the packet that you put together, that was
- 12 addressed to Chairwoman
- 13 I also have noticed that you sent numerous letters to the
- 14 Chairwoman, and I've read them, as well as your statements
- of apology to the so I have reviewed that material
- 16 as well.
- Okay. Well, I appreciate your participation today, and
- 18 your answers. We're going to consider everything that's in
- 19 the packet, as well as your file, and your answers to the
- 20 interview.
- 21 We will get back to you, in writing, in a couple of
- 22 days. Okay.
- 23 THE INMATE: All right.
- 24 COMM. ALEXANDER: Thank you.
- 25 (Hearing concluded.)

<u>DECISION</u>

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4 COMM. ALEXANDER: Parole is

5 denied. Twenty-four months. Next appearance, 3/15.

6 After carefully reviewing your record, a personal 7 interview and due deliberation, this panel concludes that 8 discretionary release is not presently warranted, as there 9 is a reasonable probability you would not live at liberty 10 without again violating the law and, furthermore, your 11 release would be incompatible with the welfare of society, 12 and would so deprecate the serious nature of the crime as to 13 undermine respect for the law.

You stand convicted of the serious offense of
Manslaughter First, wherein you, while committing a robbery
with other co-defendants, stabbed a victim numerous times.
You were on parole at the time of this offense.

18 Your long and extensive Criminal History dates back to 19 the 1970s, and this is your third time in state prison.

This panel remains concerned about the violent nature of your entire Criminal History.

The panel also makes note of all statutory factors, including your rehabilitative efforts and programming, risk and needs assessment, re-entry plans, parole packet, sentencing minutes, and your overall disciplinary record,

1	which includes a Tier II ticket, since your last Parole
2	interview.
3	Despite your positive efforts while incarcerated,
4	discretionary release should not be granted merely because
5	of good conduct or program completion, but after considering
6	all statutory factors.
7	After weighing all required factors, your discretionar
8	release, at this time, is denied.
9	(All Commissioners concur.)
