Did you target 4 Q. 5 this house, specifically? 6 No, I didn't know the victim. Α. 7 I was out on the street selling drugs. I was working, and I lost my job, and I started hanging out 8 9 with individuals that had the same drug problem that I 10 had. 21	Q. We have the letter here from Ready, Willing and
22	Able and, also, the Osborne Association, from 2012.
23	What do you think, as you look back on your life,
24	four bids in prison, someone has died? What do you
25	think about all that?
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A. Well, when I was growing up, I was raised in a
 broken home. My mother, she had to raise thirteen kids,
 by herself.

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4 Q. She must be a saint.

5 A. Three of them had to go to a foster home.

6 When the three oldest left, that left me in 7 charge. My mother had to go out and work, and that left 8 me the oldest in the house.

9 My brothers and sister went to bed hungry at
10 night, many times, and I went out and stole, and brought
11 food back, so they could eat.

12 I grew up too fast. I used to watch my mother 13 and father fight all the time. I went through a rough 14 life.

15 Q. And, you know, we hear that a lot. A lot of 16 people go through tough times. Some learn from those 17 experiences and move forward, and try to do the right 18 thing. It looks like you fell into the drug life; is 19 that fair to say?

A. Yes. Yes.
