1 COMM. SMITH: Good afternoon. What's your

2 name, sir?

THE INMATE:

4 COMM. SMITH: , you can hear us

5 fine?

6 THE INMATE: Yes, sir.

7 COMM. SMITH: They just had to adjust the

8 volume. I am Commissioner Smith. I am

- 9 joined today by Commissioner Berliner and
- 10 Commissioner Shapiro.
- 11 COMM. BERLINER: Good afternoon, sir.
- 12 COMM. SHAPIRO: Good afternoon.
- THE INMATE: Good afternoon, ma'am. Good
- 14 afternoon, sir.
- 15 INTERVIEW BY COMMISSIONER SMITH:
- 16 Q. You are here for a reappearance interview,
- 17 having been seen a number of times. Your first
- 18 appearance was in 2007.
- 19 You have a controlling sentence of twenty-five
- 20 to life for Murder in the Second Degree; is that
- 21 correct?
- 22 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. We note that you have been seen since that
- time, and there were a couple of postponements, but,
- 25 generally, when you were seen up to this point,

- 1 you've been given twenty-four-month holds and you are
- 2 approaching about thirty-seven years in State service
- 3 for this matter; is that correct?
- 4 A. Yes, sir.
- 5 Q. You have been cautioned in the past that there
- 6 is a record, there is a transcript being made, that
- 7 could be used at any post-conviction proceeding. I
- 8 know you have talked about the instant offense. Are
- 9 you under any appeal of your verdict at this time?
- 10 A. No, sir.
- 11 Q. Okay. Any hesitation talking about the instant
- 12 offense?
- 13 A. No, sir. Before we start, I would like to ask
- 14 for my forgiveness for the nature of this crime. I
- 15 would like to ask the Panel, and
- , and her daughter, and her family, to please
- 17 forgive me.
- 18 Q. All right. The instant offense is one of many
- 19 things we look at, as we determine whether now is an
- 20 appropriate time for you to go into the community.
- 21 As we look to that, you have some documents
- 22 that you have submitted. In addition, there is an
- 23 indication that you have some family members, a
- 24 cousin named , there is also
- 25 those two are listed as being potential

- 1 residences.
- What is your desire on where you would live, if
- 3 released, at this time,
- 4 A. With
- 5 Q. Is there anyone else in that household?
- 6 A. No, sir.
- 7 Q. And why don't you tell me about your
- 8 relationship with ?
- 9 A. That's my niece, sir.
- 10 Q. It's one of your sibling's children; is that
- 11 right?
- 12 A. Yes.
- 13 Q. How old is she, approximately?
- 14 A. She is about forty-four, forty-five.
- 15 Q. So she has a stable environment that you could
- 16 go to?
- 17 A. Yes, sir.
- 18 Q. Your COMPAS is a risk and needs assessment,
- 19 it's a tool, and it basically gives us some ideas of
- 20 areas of strengths and other areas where there may be
- 21 some concerns. It's a scale of 1 to 10. 1 is low
- 22 risk. You can go higher and higher, until 10 is the
- 23 highest risk.
- 24 Actually, under family support, they call it
- low family support, but your score is a 1, and that's

- 1 what you want it to be, low numbers, low risk. Even
- though some of the verbiage might be a little bit
- 3 confusing, that's kind of the way that it works.
- 4 Now, as you served your time, you have
- 5 submitted some documents, including commendable work
- reports. We have one from Green Haven, where you 6
- 7 have been a porter. I think it's _____, is that
- 8 right?
- 9 A. It's (ph), sir.
- 10 Do you know how he spells his last name? 0.
- 11 Α. No.
- Okay, I think it might be as I said. It's a 12
- signature, so it's not as easy, but he has written a 13
- 14 couple of times, giving you some good evaluations.
- 15 You have also submitted in the past -- I don't
- believe this is recent. It this looks like it is 16
- 17 2016. The most current there is a listing, sort of a
- 18 community petition, that you submitted of individuals
- 19 who are writing on your behalf. You have done
- similar things in the past. In 2012, there is a 20
- similar document. 21
- 22 The letters that we have include an older
- 23 letter from a family member named
- What's the relation with _____? She's a family 24
- member, right? 25

- Yes. 1 A.
- 2 We have other petitions that you have done in
- terms of priors, 2010, for example. Do you have any 3
- 4 more recent correspondence from
- She comes to see me all the time, sir, that's 5
- my niece. 6
- 7 I was wondering if there was any new 0.
- information. We certainly have a listing of 8
- individuals that call you and also come and see you. 9
- 10 What does she actually do for income?
- A. It's a community thing. LBG, some kind of 11
- 12 community thing. She works for somebody in public
- 13 office.
- Q. You had submitted a letter in 2016. Among 14
- 15 other things you had described, briefly, the crime,
- 16 itself. You described some of the things you had
- 17 sought to accomplish on the inside. Your folder
- 18 includes that and the documents from your prior
- submissions. 19
- 20 I think you were twenty-one, when the crime
- 21 occurred, and you are about fifty-eight, at this
- 22 point; is that right?
- 23 Yes, sir. I'll be fifty-nine.
- 24 Do you have any letters from an employer, that
- would be willing to give you job, at this point, any 25

- 1 specific letters?
- Well, my intention was, when I go to my parole 2
- 3 officer, I would like to deal with the youth. I
- would like to be a speaker, to explain my situation,
- 5 what happened to me, and how I messed up in life.
- 6 Q. How far have you gotten in school?
- Not that far, sir. 7 A.
- What grade did you accomplish on the outside? 8 Q.
- 9 A. Seventh to eighth.
- What about on the inside, have you gotten into 10
- 11 a high school equivalency program?
- A. Yes. I was in GED, but I have a special ed 12
- 13 issue, so I'm working and trying to do the best I
- 14 I missed school.
- Have you reached out to any agencies and gotten 15
- 16 any letters from agencies, where you could possibly
- work with them, on a situation as you talked about? 17
- 18 A. Yes, the
- 19 Do you have any letters from them?
- 20 If I'm not mistaken, they wrote you all the
- 21 last Parole Board hearing, they wrote letters for me.
- 22 I don't see anything recent. Again, I know you
- 23 have been seen since 2007.

- 24 Α. Yes.
- 25 So nothing more recent. We look, overall, at Q.

- 1 what you've done during this time. You have in your
- COMPAS, probably the highest COMPAS score you have is 2
- under prison misconduct, you have a 10. 3
- Your history of violence, certainly the instant
- 5 offense is violent, and you spoke a little bit about
- that before, you have a score of 4. 6
- 7 Α. Yes.
- During the instant offense there were 8 Q.
- co-defendants of yours, as well as yourself. 9
- 10 Α. Yes.
- It looks like you were engaging in some 11 Q.
- robberies. Had you done robberies before, with these 12
- individuals? 13
- A. No, sir. 14
- The night of this crime the victim was walking 15
- 16 into the house, when you came upon him; is that
- right? 17
- 18 Α. Yes.
- 19 Q. Had you followed him to the house?
- 20 Yes, sir. Α.
- And: where did you originally see him? 21 Q.
- 22 We just picked the car random, sir. We were Α.
- 23 driving behind the car.
- 24 Q. Why would you pick that car?
- 25 Α. It was just a car, sir. There was no specific

- 1 reason.
- What was your intentions? Q.
- 3 Α. To do a robbery, sir.
- What were you going to use the proceeds of the
- 5 robbery for?
- 6 A. To buy clothes.
- 7 Were you working then or not employed? Q.
- I wasn't employed. 8 A.
- What about your co-defendants? 9 Q.
- Neither one of them, if I can recall. 10 Α.
- You concealed your identities with masks; is 11 Q.
- 12 that right?
- Yes, sir. 13 A.
- And each of you had a gun, correct? 14 0.
- 15 A. Yes, sir.
- 16 How did you get the money to buy the guns? Q.
- I borrowed the gun from a female. 17 A.
- 18 She actually testified in the trial; is that Q.
- 19 right
- 20 Yes, she did. A.
- You didn't have a valid license, did you? 21 Q.
- No. 22 A.
- 23 Who drove the car there? Q.
- 24 A.
- 25 Q. Did you get the other two,

- , did you get their guns from the same woman?
- 2 A. No, sir.
- 3 Q. Where did they get their guns from?
- 4 A. I don't recall, sir. I don't know. They came
- 5 and picked me up.
- 6 Q. You had three men, so why didn't you just do
- 7 strong-arm robberies; not that that is acceptable,
- 8 but versus introducing the firearms? Why would you
- 9 do that?
- 10 A. First of all, sir, let me explain it to you. I
- 11 never really knew anything about this here. This is
- 12 something I did at the spur of the moment. I didn't
- 13 know no better. This is not my history. I don't
- 14 abuse guns and rob people. I got into this
- 15 situation, and I just played a part.
- Now, I know much better then I did back then.
- 17 I was young, and I didn't know no better, and I just
- 18 got caught up with some individuals.
- 19 Q. The individual that was shot and killed, this
- 20 man was right in his own driveway, and he was shot
- 21 pointblank in his chest; was he?
- 22 A. Yes.
- Q. How many other people were there, that were
- 24 shot at?
- 25 A. Two.

- Two others? 1 0.
- Yes, sir, the father-in-law and the 2
- 3 mother-in-law. !
- 4 It looks like the individual that was shot
- 5 basically came out, and it says he identified himself
- as a police officer and said "Don't move," and I 6
- think it was one of your co-defendants that then shot 7
- 8 him, right?
- 9 Yes, sir Α.
- And you all fled. How many days after that 10 0.
- 11 were you arrested, or how many months after that were
- 12 you arrested?
- Approximately, a year later, sir. 13
- Q. If you didn't know what was going on, why 14
- didn't you go to the police, before, during that 15
- time, and let them know what happened? 16
- 17 A. All right, sir, not knowing no better, sir, it
- was bad judgment, being young in the streets and not 18
- 19 thinking.
- Now, you were actually sentenced out of the 20
- 21 court of the Honorable is that right?
- 22 Yes, sir. Α.
- 23 It looks like your attorney was
- 24 is that true?
- 25 Yes: Α.

- 1 By law, we have several individuals that we
- 2 have to reach out to and ask for comments. We do
- have a letter, and have had letters, from the 3
- district attorney's office, as it relates to your
- 5 matter.
- 6 Also, of course, we have the Sentencing
- 7 Minutes, where your attorney had spoken, and where
- 8 the district attorney and the judge, of course, as
- well, had spoken. You spoke a little bit during that 9
- 10 sentencing, as well. Do you recall that?
- Yes, sir. 11 Α.
- 12 Q. One of the things the Court was saying, during
- 13 this sentencing, is there have been absolutely no
- 14 mitigating facts or circumstances surrounding the
- 15 vicious acts, the wanton acts, these defendants stand
- 16 convicted of before the court.
- 17 He goes on, the Judge said: "The Court wishes
- 18 it was within its power to order their death by
- 19 execution, but, unfortunately, the people in charge
- 20 of the state, for many, many, years, have decided" --
- 21 and it goes on to just talk about that there was no
- 22 capital punishment.
- 23 You know, be that as it may, it's this forum,
- the three of us, Commissioner Berliner, Commissioner 24
- Shapiro and myself, that determine whether or not 25

- l your freedom is issued, so we recognize that is the
- 2 law of the state, and we certainly take this
- 3 seriously.
- As far as your information in the folder, there
- 5 are scores of low risk for felony violence, it's a 4
- 6 out of 10, so it's not the lowest, and you also have
- 7 low risk of arrest, absconding and criminal
- 8 involvement.
- 9 Your history of violence is a 4, it's low,
- 10 although, certainly, the acts that occurred here were
- 11 certainly violent.
- Once the victim was shot, why would other
- individuals be shot at? I think there was a wife
- 14 there, the wife of the deceased, maybe children of
- 15 the deceased were there, as well, a couple of little
- 16 kids came out; is that right?
- 17 A. No, no, there were no kids.
- 18 O. Just the adults?
- 19 A. Yes
- 20 Q. So why continue to fire?
- 21 A. Well, I ran, sir. I never fired no gun. The
- 22 gun I had was never fired. I had a .25 automatic.
- 23 When I heard the first shot, I ran.
- 24 If you look in the record it states that
- , when I gave her back her gun, it

- wasn't fired. 1
- 0. , that's who you got the gun
- 3 from?
- 4 Α. Yes. When I returned her gun to her, the gun
- 5 was never fired.
- 6 I think I mentioned before, your prison
- misconduct is a score of 10. I have not counted them 7
- up, in total, but you have a number of disciplinary 8
- 9 violations, I think it was maybe twenty-three. It
- 10 was certainly more than twenty, during this
- 11 twenty-five-year minimum and the records we have only
- 12 go back to '90. Prior to that I think you were
- 13 sentenced and came upstate in '83, and those are not
- 14 on the computer.
- 15 You had some alcohol intoxicant, some drug use,
- 16 you had fighting and some violent conduct in the
- 17 past.
- 18 First of all, what drugs would you have used in
- state prison? 1 19
- 20 I smoked marijuana, sir.
- 21 Again, you had some fighting. More recently,
- 22 your last discipline was in May of 2015, creating a
- 23 disturbance, flammable matter at Green Haven.
- 24 did you do there?
- 25 A. My hot pot burned out, sir.

- 1 Q. What did you do?
- I kept it plugged in and the pot melted a 2
- 3 little bit.
- I looked at the years, it's kind of sporadic. 4
- Out of the last twenty-five years, which is what your 5
- minimum is, obviously you served longer than that, I 6
- 7 think I counted about eleven or twelve of those
- years, you had discipline. So you go a year or two, 8
- 9 and then you have two or three years that you're on.
- 10 Why do you think you have struggled throughout
- the time with the behavior? 11
- Sometimes, in an environment like this, things 12 A.
- 13 happen. I learned, now, to walk away from things,
- 14 and I've grown now. I know how to pay things no
- 15 mind, now. Growing up in here, you know, things
- 16 happen in here, when you're in an environment like
- 17 this.
- 18 You have been doing food service work for the Q.
- last year or so; is that right? 19
- 20 Yes, sir. Α.
- 21 How is that going? Q.
- 22 Good, sir. Α.
- 23 0. You did some porter work. It says they wanted
- 24 you to get involved in some educational programs at
- 25 Green Haven and you refused that. It says you

- refused vocational porter in building 2. Why would 1
- 2 you do that?
- I never refused it, that's where I used to work 3
- 4 at, sir.
- 5 Q. I am looking at a note, that's a computer
- printout. I know I have some actual forms the 6
- facility provided. This is 2014, this is academic 7
- programming, a refusal for that in '14 and '13. 8
- You say you have some educational difficulties. 9
- 10 Why not try to go through it, though?
- 11 A. I have, sir. I have a sleeping disorder. I
- 12 fall asleep a lot. If I'm sitting down too long, I
- 13 have a problem, I fall asleep.
- I'm not justifying me not being in school, 14
- 15 there is no justification for that, but I have a
- 16 learning disability.
- 17 Right, you said that. It looks like most of 0.
- 18 the refusals that you have are for the educational
- 19 programs. Did you ever refuse the ART program?
- 20 No, I completed all that, sir.
- 21 ART is an aggression program. What other Q.
- programs have you done, that you found particularly 22
- 23 beneficial, sir?
- 24 ART, RSAT. Α.
- 25 Q. RSAT is a substance abuse program. Again, we

- talked about using drugs in prison. 1
- 2 Α. Yes.
- It looks to me like you completed ART, in 3
- 4 Clinton, in 2012; is that correct?
- Yes, sir. 5 Α.
- Very good. Your Case Plan is developed with 6 0.
- your counselor, wanting you to do some things to 7
- prepare yourself, and one of them is to be involved 8
- in the YAP program; have you done that? 9
- 10 Α. Yes.
- 11 That's a good way for you to help others to 0.
- maybe not get into the difficulties that you have, 12
- 13 and you've talked about that, right?
- Yes, sir. 14 Α.
- 15 0. It says attend AA, on a weekly basis. What's
- 16 the status for that?
- 17 It's a program where we all sit together and
- 18 talk about drinking and staying away from stuff.
- 19 I know what AA is. What's the status of you 0.
- 20 participating in that?
- 21 I completed that, sir. . A .
- 22 For you to maintain good family relationships,
- 23 which is one of the things we talked about, first,
- 24 going in here.
- 25 There is a lot to look at, certainly not just

; 0 %

- the instant offense. We take into account your 1
- 2 comments, as well.
- As you mentioned, this is the first time that 3
- 4 you have been in state prison. Your Presentence
- 5 Investigation Report says the only prior juvenile
- 6 history, is you were placed on six months probation
- 7 from Family Court and administratively discharged; is
- that right? 8
- 9 A. Yes, sir.
- 10 Q. I see the listing. What was that for? What
- activity were you getting involved in? 11
- A. School, school. 12
- COMM. SMITH: I have asked you a lot of 13
- questions: I don't know if Commissioner Berliner has 14
- 15 any questions.
- 16 COMM. BERLINER: I do not have any
- 17 questions. Thank you.
- COMM. SMITH: Is there any questions from 18
- 19 Commissioner Shapiro?
- 20 COMM. SHAPIRO: No. I have listened
- 21 carefully. Thank you.
- 22 CONTINUED BY COMMISSIONER SMITH:
- 23 Is there anything else you want to add today, 0.
- 24 The last word is yours.
- 25 Just to say that I'm sorry. Please, I ask for A.

7 parole denied. Hold 24 months.

8 Next appearance, November 2020.

9 Following a personal interview, record review and

10 deliberation, this Panel finds that your release to

11 supervision is incompatible with the public safety and

12 welfare. Therefore, parole at this time is denied.

We have considered your COMPAS Risk and Needs

14 Assessment. Significant weight has been placed on your

15 poor behavior during this term. You have incurred more

16 than twenty disciplinary reports.

17 Your high COMPAS prison misconduct score reflects

18 your poor compliance with DOCCS rules. You are serving

19 a sentence with a twenty-five-year minimum. Records

20 show that your most recent report occurred in May of

21 2015.

We have reviewed your programming, Case Plan, and

discussed your learning difficulties. Also discussed

24 were the Sentencing Minutes, and include comments made

25 in later letters from the district attorney.

1	Your family support and limited criminal record are
2	reflective in low COMPAS scores, which are positive.
3	Documents you submitted are generally from past parole
4	interviews, but were considered.
5	Most compelling this Panel finds you need to
6	maintain a clean disciplinary record, over a significant
7	period of time. We also encourage you to develop and
8	document appropriate release plans.
9	To grant your release at this time would so
10	deprecate the seriousness of your offense as to
11	undermine respect for the law. Parole is therefore
12	denied.
13	(Commissioner Smith and Commissioner Berliner
14	concur.)
15	(Commissioner Shapiro dissents.)
