THE ART OF SUMMATION. Edited by Melvin Block. New York: New York State Association of Trial Lawyers. 1963. Pp. xxv, 394. \$10.00. This book derives from the symposia held under the auspices of the New York State Association of Trial Lawyers.

THE AUTOMOBILE UNDER THE BLUE EAGLE: LABOR, MANAGEMENT, AND THE AUTOMOBILE MANUFACTURING CODE. By Sidney Fine. Ann Arbor: The University of Michigan Press. 1963. Pp. viii, 566. \$15.00. An analysis of the effects of the N.I.R.A. on the automobile industry, including descriptions of the role of pressure groups in drafting the automobile manufacturing code, the N.I.R.A.'s long range effect on wage-and-hour policies in the industry, the relationship of manufacturers to dealers and suppliers, and the workers' early attempts to unionize and bargain with their employers.

BIG BUSINESS IN THE THIRD REICH. By Arthur Schweitzer. Bloomington: Indiana University Press. 1964. Pp. xii, 739. \$7.50. The origins and workings of the Third Reich's war economy and the complex relationship between Hitler's government and the Nazi party on one hand and the military and big business on the other.

CASES AND MATERIALS ON DEBTOR AND CREDITOR. By Vern Countryman. Boston, Toronto: Little, Brown and Co. 1964. Pp. lxxvii, 841. \$12.50. A casebook.

CHALLENGES TO DEMOCRACY: THE NEXT TEN YEARS. Edited by Edward Reed. New York and London: Frederick A. Praeger. 1963. Pp. vi, 245. \$1.95 paperbound. Essays which analyze and re-assess the workings of our democratic institutions.

COLLECTIVE BARGAINING IN THE AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY. By Robert M. MacDonald. New Haven and London: Yale University Press. Pp. x, 410. \$3.50. An examination of the ways in which unionism has affected the structure and composition of wages and the pattern of labor costs in a key sector of the American economy.

COMPETITION AND MONOPOLY: LEGAL AND ECONOMIC ISSUES. By Mark S. Massel. Garden City: Anchor Books, Doubleday & Company, Inc. 1964. Pp. xiii, 386. \$1.45 paperbound. An exploration of the interrelations of economics and law.

CONGRESSIONAL CONTROL OF ADMINISTRATION. By Joseph P. Harris. Washington, D.C.: The Brookings Institution. 1964. Pp. xi, 306. \$5.75. Concerned with legislative control over the administration of the departments and agencies of the executive branch, this book contains a warning against excessive congressional supervision while suggesting more effective ways for the legislative branch to exercise control.

THE CONGRESSMAN: HIS WORK AS HE SEES IT. By Charles L. Clapp. Washington, D.C.: The Brookings Institution. 1963. Pp. viii, 452. \$6.00. Based on a series of Brookings conferences and follow-up interviews with Members of the House, this book explores all facets of a congressman's life.

- THE CONTEMPT POWER.** By Ronald L. Goldfarb. New York and London: Columbia University Press. 1963. Pp. ix, 366. A history and critique of the contempt power and the courts, with a suggested revision.
- COURT AND CONSTITUTION IN JAPAN.** By John M. Maki. Seattle: University of Washington Press. 1964. Pp. xlvi, 445. \$9.50. A collection of representative constitutional decisions of the Japanese Supreme Court, dealing with many aspects of Japanese culture which add a new diversion to an understanding of such social, economic and political issues as land reform, changes in the family system, the role of the National Diet, censorship and civil rights.
- THE DEATH PENALTY IN AMERICA.** Edited by Hugo Adam Bedau. Garden City: Anchor Books, Doubleday & Company, Inc. 1964. Pp. xiv, 584. \$1.95 paperbound. The author concentrates on the crime of murder and the death penalty in America.
- INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS: PRINCIPLES AND PROBLEMS.** By Howe Martin. New York: The Free Press of Glencoe, A Division of The Macmillan Company. 1964. Pp. xiv, 288. \$5.50. An analysis of the international business enterprise covering the various social and economic factors which lead firms to set up overseas subsidiaries and the various legal forms this can take.
- INTERVENTION AND DOLLAR DIPLOMACY IN THE CARIBBEAN, 1900-1921.** By Dana G. Munro. Princeton: Princeton University Press. 1964. Pp. ix, 553. \$12.00. The view that selfish interests of American business dominated American foreign policy during the first part of this century is challenged.
- JEFFERSON & CIVIL LIBERTIES.** By Leonard W. Levy. Cambridge: The Belknap Press of Harvard University. 1963. Pp. xv, 225. \$4.50. A fully documented analysis of the darker side of Thomas Jefferson's record on civil liberties.
- JURIMETRICS.** Edited by Hans E. Baade. New York and London: Basic Books Inc. 1964. Pp. 270. \$5.95. A symposium which discusses the three major areas of present jurimetric activity: electronic data storage and retrieval, behavior analysis of decisions, and the use of symbolic logic.
- LAISSEZ FAIRE AND THE GENERAL-WELFARE STATE.** By Sidney Fine. Ann Arbor: Ann Arbor Paperbacks, The University of Michigan Press. 1964. Pp. x, 468. \$2.95 paperbound. An exploration of American thought from 1865 to 1901.
- THE MINISTER AND THE CHOIR SINGER.** By William M. Kunstler. New York: William Morrow & Company. 1964. Pp. viii, 344. \$5.95. A lawyer offers a solution to a celebrated unsolved homicide.
- ***MODERN BUSINESS LAW.** By A. Lincoln Lavine. Englewood Cliffs: Prentice-Hall, Inc. 2d ed. 1963. Pp. xvi, 844. \$11.95.
- THE MYTHMAKERS: AN ESSAY ON POWER AND WEALTH.** By Bernard D. Nossiter. Boston: Houghton Mifflin Company. 1964. Pp. viii, 244. \$4.00. An examination of the economic policy of the Kennedy Administration and the position of business in society generally, with a proposal for a form of planned economy based on the success of this approach elsewhere in the world.

Pp. xxiv, 1187. \$13.30. An alternate edition for use in states which have adopted the Uniform Commercial Code.
- SAMUEL GOMPERS: A BIOGRAPHY. By Bernard Mandel. Yellow Springs: The Antioch Press. 1963. Pp. xxii, 566. \$8.00. Life and times of an American labor leader and organizer of the American Federation of Labor.
- SCIENTISTS AND NATIONAL POLICY-MAKING. Edited by Robert Gilpin and Christopher Wright. New York and London: Columbia University Press. 1964. Pp. viii, 307. \$7.50. Ten contributors study the relation of science and government and the place of scientists in American politics today.
- SELECTED ESSAYS ON THE CONFLICT OF LAWS. By Brainerd Currie. Durham: Duke University Press. 1963. Pp. x, 761. \$15.00. The author's point is that any search for an ideal system of choice-of-law rules will be futile and the abandonment of such efforts will free the energies of courts and scholars to seek optimum solutions of real problems through ordinary legal and political methods.
- SOVIET FOREIGN PROPAGANDA. By Frederick C. Barghoorn. Princeton: Princeton University Press. 1964. Pp. vii, 329. \$6.00. The development of Communist thought and practice concerning the uses of foreign propaganda, by the Yale professor who was held for two weeks on an espionage charge while traveling in Russia.

WALTER LIPPMANN'S PHILOSOPHY OF INTERNATIONAL POLITICS. By Anwar Hussain Syed. Philadelphia: University of Pennsylvania Press. 1963. Pp. 358. \$6.00. An attempt to discover and state Lippmann's philosophy of international politics as it has developed over the years 1913 to 1963.

YOUNG HENRY FORD: A PICTURE HISTORY OF THE FIRST FORTY YEARS. By Sidney Olson. Detroit: Wayne State University Press. 1963. Pp. 188. \$9.95. A novel approach to illuminate the life and time of Henry Ford.
