- Basic Corporate Practice. By George C. Seward. Philadelphia: Joint-Committee on Continuing Legal Education. 1966. Pp. xxii, 305. \$15.00. Includes discussions of both pre- and post-incorporation problems.
- CHILDREN IN THE COURTS—THE QUESTION OF REPRESENTATION. Edited by George G. Newman. Ann Arbor: Institute of Continuing Legal Education. 1967. Pp. 571. Designed to serve as a reference for an expanding critical examination of the rights of juveniles.
- FREEDOM OF THE PRESS FROM HAMILTON TO THE WARREN COURT. Edited by Harold L. Nelson. New York: Bobbs-Merrill Co. 1967. Pp. lxviii, 420. \$7.50. A collection of essays and Supreme Court cases, including a chapter on contempt of court jurisprudence.
- Freedom of the Press from Zenger to Jefferson. Edited by Leonard W. Levy. New York: Bobbs-Merrill Co. 1966. Pp. lxxxiii, 409. \$7.50. Essays which form the basis for a study of the primary sources of the American attitude toward freedom of the press.
- THE LABOR REVOLUTION: TRADE UNIONS IN A NEW AMERICA. By Gus Tyler. New York: The Viking Press. 1967. Pp. 279. \$6.50. The author maintains that the labor movement, rather than being a thing of the past, is on the threshold of its most significant period.
- LAW AND THE BALANCE OF POWER: THE AUTOMOBILE MANUFACTURERS AND THEIR DEALERS. By Stewart Macaulay. New York: Russell Sage Foundation. 1966. Pp. xix, 224. \$5.00. An account of the automobile dealer's efforts to find legal remedies for what they consider the unfair practices of the manufacturers.
- LAWYERS AND THEIR WORK: AN ANALYSIS OF THE LEGAL PROFESSION IN THE UNITED STATES AND ENGLAND. By Quintin Johnstone & Dan Hopson, Jr. New York: Bobbs-Merrill Co. 1967. Pp. x, 604. \$10.00. The authors identify common problems which face the legal profession in the United States and England and offer solutions designed to improve the quality and availability of legal services.
- POLITICAL AND CIVIL RIGHTS IN THE UNITED STATES. (3d Ed.) (2 Vols.) By Thomas I. Emerson, David Haber & Norman Dorsen. Boston: Little, Brown and Co. 1967. Pp. Vol. I: xxviii, 1355; Vol. II: xiv, 819. \$45.00. A comprehensive reference, designed to provide a contemporary view, rather than an historical perspective, of political and civil rights.
- THE PREPARATION OF COMMERCIAL AGREEMENTS. By Ludwig Mandel. New York: Practising Law Institute. 1966. Pp. x, 191. \$7.00. While the emphasis of the book is on New York law, statutes and decisions of other jurisdictions have been included.

- PROBLEMS OF PROOF IN ARBITRATION. Edited by Dallas L. Jones. Washington: The Bureau of National Affairs, Inc. 1967. Pp. ix, 416. \$8.50. Proceedings of the Nineteenth Annual Meeting of the National Academy of Arbitrators.
- THE PROGRESSIVES. Edited by Carl Resek. New York: Bobbs-Merrill Co. 1967. Pp. xxxviii, 397. \$3.75 paperbound. Essays written at the turn of the century, describing the existing conditions and catching the spirit and excitement of the progressive movement.
- PSYCHOANALYSIS, PSYCHIATRY AND LAW. By Jay Katz, Joseph Goldstein & Alan M. Dershowitz. New York: The Free Press. 1967. Pp. xxiii, 845. \$15.00. An important and heuristic study in the area of mental commitment.
- THE ROOTS OF FREEDOM: A CONSTITUTIONAL HISTORY OF ENGLAND. By Bernard Schwartz. New York: Hill and Wang. 1967. Pp. vii, 248. \$5.75. A history of the growth of parliamentary government in England.
- THE SHRINE OF PARTY: CONGRESSIONAL VOTING BEHAVIOR, 1841-1852. By Joel H. Silbey. Pittsburgh: University of Pittsburgh Press. 1967. Pp. x, 292. \$6.00. Using advanced statistical methods, the author partially disproves the traditional concept that party loyalty had completely degenerated in the years preceding the Civil War.
- THE SUPREME COURT: LAW AND DISCRETION. Edited by Wallace Mendelson. New York: Bobbs-Merrill Co. 1967. Pp. xvii, 509. \$4.25 paperbound. Contains excerpts from Supreme Court cases designed to provide primary sources of the development of American thought.
- Toward a General Theory of the First Amendment. By Thomas I. Emerson. New York: Random House. 1966. Pp. ix, 245. \$4.95. The author examines the function of freedom of expression in a democratic society, explores some of the practical problems of maintaining a system of free expression, and analyzes the role of law in developing and supporting such a system.
- U.S. INCOME TAXATION OF FOREIGN CORPORATIONS AND NONRESIDENT ALIENS. By Sidney I. Roberts & William C. Warren. New York: Practising Law Institute. 1966. \$55.00 including a separately bound, 450-page supplement published in 1967.
